

Cold Weather Necessitates Increase in Cash Grants

Adeline S. Kell, head counselor of the social welfare section, today released following statement:

"The War Relocation Authority public assistance program which is carried on by the welfare section at Heart Mountain continues to be very active. Cold weather necessitates an increase in cash grants for many unemployable persons who need heavy clothing. Cash grants for household necessities and personal needs have been issued to families that lack resources for basic essentials as follows:

September, 1944	321 families	529 persons	\$2074.75
October, 1944	325 families	583 persons	2457.20

"Included among the families were 21 families that received special cash grants to cover costs of travel to other centers, eye glasses and surgical appliances. In September, October and November, cash grants have been issued to 97 families not included in the case load for preceding months. Cash allowances for clothing have been issued to project workers and their dependents as follows:

September, 1944	2241 families	6510 persons	\$23,515.18
October, 1944	2075 families	5896 persons	21,132.27

"The number of project workers decreased in October because so many able-bodied persons left project work to take more profitable employment outside of the center. A large number of workers who formerly depended on project employment are meeting their own needs and the needs of their dependents who remain here in the center from earnings at jobs outside.

"At the request of the War department, welfare section is assisting families with members in the United States army to obtain servicemen's dependency allowances. Twenty two family investigations on such cases have been completed during the past month; additional requests which are being received currently will be handled promptly. This service is very important in assisting evacuees in relocating as well as in meeting their daily needs while living in the center. Welfare section also carries on a program for aged persons and their dependents in connection with filing claims for old age insurance issued by the Social Security board, Federal Security agency. In the past three months families that formerly were obliged to depend on small cash grants from War Relocation Authority public assistance program have been found eligible for old age insurances which provide larger monthly payments to these families."
