Additional Facts Made Known in Auburn Case

The following teletype wessage was received from R_{\bullet} B. Cozzens of the San Francisco WRA office:

"On Jan. 20, because of rumors, newspaper and radio accounts of 'incidents' at Auburn, Calif., involving returnee Sumio Doi, his father and mother, we teletyped to all projects the facts in the case, including the statement that 'Governor Warron and State Attorney General Kenny, apprised of facts, immediately requested full protection for Doi family, followed up with conference with Placer County Superior court judge, sheriff and district attorney who assured protection.'

. "To substantitate our assertion that state and county law enforcement-bodies and officials are on the job we now give you those additional facts: Two brothers, both AWOL from the army, in custody of civil authorities at Auburn together with two other brothers, the latter civilians and distant neighbors of the Dois, have been charged with felon counts or arson and attempted dynamiting in the Doi case.

"Those in custody arc; Pvt. Elmer R. Johnson, 20, picked up by MP's and turned over to civil authorities; his brother, Alvin E. Johnson, 18, both of Redding; James Edward Watson, 38, an Auburn bartender, and his brother Charles, 35.

"Four young women, with whom the men are said to have been on a drinking party, are considered material witnesses although released on their own recognizance while each of the men is held in liqu of \$5000 cash bail or bond of \$10,000.

"Arrests were made after intensive investigation and cooperation of state department of justice, military police, shoriff's office, district attorney's office and others.

"In the meantime, Dois have had nightly protection since Jan. 18 from state highway patrol plus special deputy sheriff costing county \$8 per night with result there have been no further incidents.

"Newspaper coverage of arrests has been adequate, impartial and unsensational.

"Our cross section survey of Auburn district shows most people fair, tolerant, non-discriminating, while adverse minority is taking pains to express opposition to violence."

Repatriates Requested to Give Change of Address

Porsons who have been designated by the Japanese government for repetriation or who have signified a desire to travel to Japan in an exchange of nationals are asked to keep the Department of State (Special Mar Problems division) and the Spanish Embassy at Washington fully informed of all changes of address. Negligence of individuals in supplying this information may cause serious complications in the exchange negotiations. For those who wish to leave a relocation center and who have requested repatriation, special forms to be filled in by applicants may be obtained from Howard Embree, assistant welfere counselor.

Income Tax Returns Must Be Filed by March 15

Income tax returns for the year 1944 are due on or before March 15, 1945, and a limited supply of the forms is now available in the project attorney's office. All persons having \$500 or more gross income are required to file a return, and all persons having income less than \$500 on which a tax was withheld by the employer, should file a return in order to obtain a refund of the tax withheld.

Persons requiring assistance in the project attorney's office should bring a W-2 withholding receipt from each outside employer and a statement from the WMA cost accounting department as to the amount of weges earned in the center (including clothing allowances). If no withholding receipt can be obtained from the employer, the return may be filed on Form 1040. However, employers ordinarily comply upon request as the law provides a \$50 civil penalty and a \$1000 fine or imprisonment for failure to furnish the withholding receipt.

Persons having income from rent, or other business investments, should bring copies of previous years' returns, if they need help in preparing this year's returns.

Married persons who are residents of Calif. and Wash. (those evacuated from those states who have not voluntarily chosen a new home) have a tax advantage over their persons, in that one-half of the cernings of either husband or wife belong to the spouse under the community property law and this automatically increases the exemption from the 3% normal tax, seving up to \$15 on each point return.

Many persons who worked outside the center during 1943 appear to have neglected to file returns for that year. They may still file returns and scoure a refund of most of the tax withhold out of their pay by their employer.

WFA Will Refund Subsistence to Potato Harvesters

The group of 20 evacues workers who returned to the center around Oct. 17 of last year from Idaho Fulls where the group was engaged in potato harvesting is requested to contact the project attorney in the Sentinel building regarding the subsistence allowance due them.

Kotaro Kozaki of 30-20-D who was placed in charge of the group stated that the WFA will forward the subsistence allowance on receipt of information which the WFA must have.
