

Departure Schedule Revised

Due to unforeseen circumstances it has been necessary to revise the departure dates of special trains leaving the center, officials announced today. Unless matters beyond the control of the railroad companies and WRA disrupt the plans the following schedule will remain effective:

Oct. 12 (delayed): Northern California, two pullman cars and two coaches; Southern California, one pullman and two coaches; 25 persons East.
Oct. 19: Northern California, one pullman and three coaches; Southern California, two pullman and four coaches; Northwest, One coach; 25 persons East.
Oct. 26: Southern California, three pullman and seven coaches.
Oct. 30: Northern California, one pullman, three coaches; Northwest, one coach; 25 persons East.
Nov. 2: Southern California, two pullman, six coaches.
Nov. 6: Northern California, one pullman, three coaches; Northwest, three coaches; 25 persons East.
Nov. 9: Northern California, one pullman, three coaches; Northwest, three coaches.
Nov. 13: Southern California, two pullman, six coaches.

Train No. 15 Leaves Tonight

Special train No. 15, originally scheduled to leave here last Friday night, will depart tonight at 7:30, Claud C. Gilmore, assistant relocation officer, announced today. Because some equipment will be lacking the coaches that would have been sent to the Northwest and East will be made part of the California-bound train, he said.

Special train No. 16, scheduled for Friday, Oct. 19, will depart as scheduled, Gilmore said he had been assured by railroad officials. Checkable baggage will be picked up Friday morning and passengers will have taxi service after the siren blows Friday evening.

Granada Center Now Closed

Amache, Colo.,--Granada went out of business as a relocation center on Oct. 15, James G. Lindley, project director, announced.

The majority of the last group to leave went to Sacramento on two all-evacuee railway coaches. Many of the 126 had expressed a desire to return earlier but waited for housing to become available in that locality on Oct. 17.

No evacuee left Amache without temporary or permanent housing having been provided at his destination. Departures from the Colorado center have been without incident or disorder. A total of nearly 10,500 evacuees have been inducted into the Granada project since August, 1942, when the first group arrived from Merced assembly center.

Agricultural land on the Amache project was declared surplus on Oct. 1, 1945. The surplus property board assigned 9,583 acres to the Farm Credit administration for disposal. Public notice has already been made that the land is for sale, in accordance with the surplus property act of 1944, which requires that government owned land must be put up for public sale within 60 days after being declared surplus.
