

Special Labor Day Program Set

C. E. Rachford, project director, will address Heart Mountain colonists at a special Labor Day program Monday, 2 p.m.

Dave Yamakawa, in charge of the program, has routed out Heart Mountain talent and the first public gathering since the earliest days of the project is promised as a gala affair.

A temporary stage will be set up in Block 14 between barracks 25-26, and the recreation field will be used for the auditorium.

Moe Yonemura has been named chairman and George Igawa's newly-named Wyoming Band will play. Others on the program include the Hawaiian Orchestra, Betty Fujimoto, tap-dancer; Lillian and Butch Morimoto in a harmonica and guitar duet; Mary Miyasaki in a vocal solo accompanied by Nobuko Sato.

Mr. Rachford is expected to formally welcome the colonists, introduce key members of his staff and outline some of the projects contemplated for Heart Mountain.

In observance of Labor Day the program will provide a brief breathing spell for colonists who have been working to get the camp into operation.

Community Enterprises on Cooperative Basis

All community enterprises such as beauty parlors, barber shops, canteens, general merchandise stores, etc., although under government supervision, will function on a cooperative basis with all profits becoming the property of the residents organized as a cooperative, Douglas M. Todd, director, stated today. Todd explained present projects have been organized through credit extension by large companies in the East.

Two canteens are in operation with a third ready for business in the immediate future. Under Wyoming laws each store is licensed and is subject to a two percent excise sales tax, Todd pointed out. Although merchandise is sold at a minimum price level it was emphasized that items shipped from the Coast and the East entailing high freight costs are inevitably higher than prevailing prices in canteens formerly patronized by residents.

According to the division director, the new store to be located opposite the offices and warehouse of the community enterprise division will feature dry goods, notions, shoes, school supplies, and various articles purchased with the best advice of the resident merchants. Some \$12,000 in shoes have been ordered as part of an ample stock to furnish the new store.

Todd declared that community enterprises will enable individuals accepted for employment to serve while getting an education. Training courses will be afforded in certain departments for all the employees, he stated.

Cooperative fire insurance is now under consideration as a community project, Todd added.
