## 200 Colonists Leave Wednesday for Rean Harvest

In response to a call for farm labor some 200 Heart Mountain colonists will leave early Wednesday morning to help with the Park County bean harvest. Workers will be provided lunch and transportation to and from the farms, and paid a flat rate of \$4 for a day's work. They will have breakfast and the evening meal at the project and return to their homes here by 6 p.m. daily.

Joe Carroll, housing and employment officer, reported a large number of workers had volunteered their services Tuesday morning when the call for help was issued. Application will continue to be taken until the quota of 200 is filled at the employment bureau in the Information office, B-21-25.

Work is expected to last from a week to 10 days. Arrangements to use colonist labor were completed at a meeting Monday night attended by WRA representatives, the Mayor of Powell, USES authorities and others.

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Carroll stressed that only colonists not working in the project would be permitted to accept this temporary outside employment.

Meanwhile plans progressed for employment in the sugar beet harvest starting about September 20 in Montana and Wyoming. Another meeting to complete arrangements is planned for either Wednesday or Thursday by representatives of the WRA, USES, sugar manufacturing companies and beet growers.

Under present plans families will be given preference for the beet harvest. Work will lest from five to seven weeks and prevailing wages will be paid. Dependents of workers left at the project will be charged a subsistence fee.

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Careful selection of workers and families will be made so as to fit each femily for the work and living facilities available at the ferm to which they are assigned. Carroll revealed there is a strong possibility these same families may get work next spring for the plowing season.

The procedure for applying for beet harvest jobs will be announced later.

Applications for work must be made through the employment division at the Information office, B-21-25. Applications made directly to other divisions will not be recognized.
