Special Bulletin on Sugar Beet Harvest

The nation has issued a call for help in the sugar beet harvest, a crop vital to the success of our country in the war. Efforts are now being made to work out arrangements so Heart Mountain colonists may accept employment in Wyoming and Southern Montana. If such satisfactory arrangements are made recruiting will be handled by the Employment Division between now and September 10th, the approximate date on which it is expected the harvest will begin.

Meanwhile, it is necessary to know immediately how many persons will be interested in volunteering for this work if they find a specific offer satisfactory. In order that this number might be determined it would be appreciated if you would fill in, detach, and leave the accompanying notice at Warehouse #13 tonight or at Information office 21-25 not later than Saturday morning Sept. 12. A meeting will be held Friday (today) Sept. 11, at 3 p.m. at Warehouse #13 where members of my staff will be available to answer any questions which you may wish to present.

Actual recruiting to be done later if satisfactory arrangements are worked out in the beet sugar harvest will be on the following basis:

1. Recruiting will be on a voluntary basis. Both families and single persons may go. The work will last until about November 15.
2. Round trip transportation and meals en route will be furnished at no cost to the worker.
3. Adequate living quarters will be provided by each employer without cost to the worker.
4. Prevailing wages will be paid. Wages will average approximately \$1.05 per ton or from \$6.00 to \$10.00 per day.
5. Assurances will have been given by the respective state governors and local law enforcement officers and county officials that law and order will be maintained.
6. Workers and their families will be authorized to leave the Center and go to designated counties and communities.
7. Those volunteering to consider acceptance of this employment will have an opportunity to make a decision and accept on the basis of definite and detailed written offers of employment which have been presented by farm operators through the U.S. Employment Service. These offers specify and describe the housing facilities, the wages, type and amount of work, length of employment and other appropriate information.
8. Acceptance of an offer of employment will constitute a definite contract agreement which can be terminated by the employer or the worker on five days notice.
9. Persons who accept employment outside the center and reside outside may retain all their earnings. Any of their dependents who remain in the center will continue to receive their subsistence.

W.R.A. Statement Released

A comprehensive statement from the War Relocation Authority regarding employment, compensation, working conditions, clothing allowances, and position of the Community Council in such matters was released today by C. E. Rachford, project director.

Every colonist the statement points out, becomes enrolled in the War Relocation Work Corps by being assigned to a job. Enlistment entitles the worker to compensation and various privileges for himself and his dependents.

Workers become members of the Order of Merit by being cited by the project director for exemplary conduct and outstanding work. A Merit Rating Board of seven members, appointed by the Community Council, will judge on nominations to the Order.

Membership entitles the worker to preferential consideration regarding leaves for private employment, preferred empicment in the project and in other matters.

Cash compensation for workers will range from \$12 to \$19 monthly. The Group I rate is termed an "entrance rate" and applies primarily to new workers and apprentices. The great bulk of workers will be in Group II receiving \$16 monthly and will include common labor requiring hard physical work.

Group III workers drawing \$19 includes those in jobs requiring responsible supervision, professional training and exceptional skills.

Working hours are set at 3 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m. daily, and 8 a.m. to noon Saturdays. Hours may be lengthened when required by the project director. Part-time workers are provided for.

A Fair Practice Committee of seven members of the Work Corps will be set up to look after the interests of workers.

Involuntarily unemployed colonists and their dependents are entitled to compensation ranging from \$4.75 monthly for adult men to \$1.50 for dependent children under 13.

Clothing allowance in the form of script redeemable at the community store will be allowed workers, their dependents and those eligible for unemployment compensation at the following rates: persons 16 years or older, \$2.75 monthly; 16 years, \$3.25 monthly; under 8 years, \$2.25 monthly. Special work clothing or uniforms will be issued gratis when their use is required.

A fuller digest of the provisions of statement will be published soon.

Temporary Court System Planned

Plans for a temporary court system to judge cases of minor infractions of the peace and misdemeanors were announced today by C. E. Rachford, project director.

The plan calls for the naming of seven judges who will sit as a body to hear cases and return their verdict in the form of a recommendation to be acted upon by the project director.

A public prosecutor will be named from among the colonists to work with the internal security police. Defendants will be permitted to retain counsel of their own choosing, or will be appointed from a panel.

As the first step in setting up the system, acting block chairmen will meet to name a group of nine colonists, seven to serve as judges and two as alternates.

These nominations by the acting-block chairmen will be subject to the approval of two-thirds of the blocks at their respective block meetings and finally, confirmation by the project director.
