

First Group of Beet Workers Leaves Wednesday

The first contingent of volunteer beet workers from Heart Mountain is expected to leave for Montana farms sometime Wednesday, Joe Carroll, housing and placement officer declared today. Carroll said other groups will set out Thursday.

Up to this morning some 550 workers have signed up for the beet harvest. Carroll asserted many more workers can be employed, and urged those interested to register at the Information office, 21-25.

Women as well as men can do the work, Carroll explained. Young couples will be especially welcomed as workers.

A committee representing workers from among the colonists met with Carroll and U. S. Employment Service men this morning to discuss housing conditions, work conditions and pay. Another meeting was scheduled for this afternoon between the workers' committee and representatives of the beet growers and processors.

Members of the workers' committee are Bill Ito, Joe Honda, Henry Tanaka, Spud Yamamoto, Harry Noda and Masao Yamate.

Meanwhile increasing numbers of workers are leaving for work with the local bean harvest.

Meal Tickets Issued to Colonists

Mess tickets which must be presented at meal-time will be distributed today to colonists by block administrative officers.

The tickets are small mimeographed coupons which will be punched at the time the bearer receives his meal.

The system is being introduced to insure that colonists eat at assigned mess halls only. The tickets will be used for the first time Wednesday morning.

Advise Against Use of Hot Plates

C. E. Rachford, project director, issued the following statement this morning regarding hot plates confiscated at assembly centers and shipped to Heart Mountain:

"We are aware of the difficulty of heating baby formula without above mentioned, but at present date, due to electrical wiring in the barracks, it is not advisable to use hot plates.

"This matter is being investigated with a view to installation of such equipment as may be necessary to accommodate the residents. The cooperation and patience of mothers will be appreciated."

Emi declared that 50 garments were completed at Pomona and there are at least 15 incomplete ones. Each person should leave his name and address attached to the garment.

Don't Make Unnecessary Ambulance Calls

Dr. Wilfred Hanaoka, medical officer, today requested that colonists refrain from making unnecessary ambulance calls if they can possibly go to the clinic. There is only one ambulance available in the Center and a call for it on a minor case may be depriving its use for an emergency.

Colonists are also asked not to make calls during the night and in the dark hours of the morning unless the case is so urgent that it requires immediate medical attention. Until the shortage of doctors can be relieved, the cooperation of everyone in the Center will be appreciated by the hospital.

Clinic, Hospital Hours Announced

Daily clinic hours at the Center hospital in Ward 15 are from 1-4 p.m. except on Saturdays and Sundays. Residents are asked to keep these hours in mind as exceptions will be made only in case of emergency.

Visiting hours have been issued by the Center hospital as follows:

- General Wards (Daily): 2-3 p.m. and 7-8 p.m.
- Pediatrics Ward (Daily): 2-3 p.m. (Immediate family only)
- Communicable Disease Ward: 2-3 p.m. only on Tuesday, Thursday, Sunday

All visitors are to enter the hospital through the main office only, and they must receive a visitor's permit before entering the wards. Only two visitors are permitted to a patient at one time. No children under 16 years are permitted in the obstetrics and isolation wards. Surgical patients are not allowed to have visitors for the first three days following their operations, without a permit from the attending physician.

Housing Adjustments Delay School Opening

The education department is unable to announce the opening date of schools because of the housing adjustments now being made, C. D. Cartor, superintendent of schools, said.

Students are asked to watch the bulletins for announcements regarding the date when classes will begin.

Population Passes 10,000th Mark

Two train-loads of arrivals from Santa Anita on Sunday brought the grand total of residents at Heart Mountain to 10,335. In the morning 561 persons were inducted while 541 were signed up in the evening.
