Your plans of possibly visiting Poston in September certainly has been the best bit of news since our arrival here, and I am hoping with all my heart, nothing will alter your plans. By then, as you say, I will be some what cooler, and the dust (probably) settled, and I'm sure the entire atmosphere of the camp will be much more pleasant. Visitors are allowed to come in any time between 8- and 5 (I presume). So far there have been no restrictions on entering camp except no cameras - no fire arms are allowed. However, I will find out just what regulations are in stand soon.

We had another warm day to-day (104°) inside our apartment

Our block has been fixed
quite nicely now - we have
elevated walks around the
houses, to the latrines, laundry
house and the mess hall. The
rest of the grounds are about
a foot lower - soon they
intend to flood it, and then
set out devil grass, which will
help to keep Poston cooler, and
much more free from dust.
