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NEW TRANSFER PLAN TOLD

Procedure To Join Families

A new procedure in applying for transfer between assembly centers or to relocation centers was announced today by Personnel Relations Officer Guy E. Wilkinson.

Transfers may be made only to reunite immediate families, the members of which resided together before evacuation.

This does not include married children who prior to evacuation maintained a separate household.

An immediate family is defined as "husband and wife, their children and such other relatives as actually resided within the family prior to evacuation."

Transfer Plan

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The only exception to the foregoing definition is where an individual or individuals are physically or mentally dependent upon the family for maintenance, it was said.

Those wishing to apply for transfers should go to their information sections for instructions and official forms, Wilkinson advised.

As always we hope that Mr. Whitney and you are well and that things in general are coming along fine.

I received a letter from my sisters yesterday and Jimmie mentioned that she asked you to get the medicines for Layne and had them waiting for us now. Thanks a lot Mrs. Whitney for doing that favor for us.

We're still here and so far we're as much in the dark as before concerning our move to Poston. If what we read in the center paper is true we won't be able to go to Poston after all. I'm going to send you the article so that you can read what I mean. Of course I'm hoping that by some lucky way will be allowed to go. Being the only one of the family out here I feel sort of lost but I'm not going to give up hoping. Time will only tell whether I'm going.

Dorothy wrote and said that the Shoji
girl's baby was born but passed away.
I know how she must feel because
our first two babies were born prematurely
and passed away. It's a shame things
like that have to happen but life is
complicated - anyway.

Layne had a very bad time with
diarrhea for over two weeks but the last
few days he's back to normal again. He
is now two years, five and a half months
old (2 yrs 5½ mos) so it may have been his
three year molars that are coming thru
that may have caused it, - altho' he didn't
have any fever which is usually the case
with teething. Whenever he gets sick or
anything happens to him I really feel
bitter that we have to live like this.
I know I shouldn't, but it's only human
nature I guess to let your emotions get
the best of you sometimes.

I wrote to Mr. Goodban and asked
him if he would send some shoes for
Layne and myself c.o.d. and he was good
enough to send them by parcel post. We
got them last week and are really
satisfied with the shoes. Since coming
here Layne has worn out two pair of
shoes so you can imagine how nice it is

for us to know a fine person as
Mr. Goodban and be able to ask favors
from him too. 158

I've ordered a number of things from
Stards and also from M. & Stards but it's
nicer to know what you're really going to
get. As far as our shoes are concerned
I won't worry about where I'm going to
order them, from now on.

To-day it's so hot and sultry but it
must be mild compared to the weather
out in Poston.

Layne is taking his daily nap. Every
afternoon he sleeps from one to two hours,
if he doesn't take a nap he gets so
cross around five p.m. so it's a habit for
his naps now.

We've been talking so much about going
to Poston that Layne thinks we're going
to "Grandpa's" camp before long. I'd really
hate to disappoint him too. At his age
he seems to understand everything and
senses what's taking place. Each day he
asks if we're going to "Layne's house" and
if I tell him we're still camping he'll
ask if we're going to "Grandpa camp to-
morrow."

They have a "Visitor's House" here now
and I understand it's much nicer than
before. We haven't had anyone to visit

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us so far tho' many of our friends said
they would like to come. It's nice of
Mr. Whitney wanting to pay us a visit
but our district won't have a Sunday
to visit until the middle of August.
The next visiting day will be July 30th
for our district and it's for only thirty (30)
minutes or so. Then too I'll have to
get a permit pass which I'll have to send
to you and you'd have to have it to be
able to get in, of course we'd have to have
one to correspond with the one we send
you. I'd have to get the passes five days
in advance of the visiting day. If Mrs. Whitney
would care to come I'd gladly get the passes
but it seems to me that for only a few
minutes you'd have to go through so much
trouble. Just your wanting to come to see us
makes us feel happy.

Thanks again Mrs. Whitney for getting the
medicines. Sumit's didn't mention about the
price of it but I won't forget to fix it up
with you later.
