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Dear Mrs. Whitney -

Both of your letters arrived last week, and I was more than pleased to have received two from you. In weeks by gone, I knew I have failed telling you the dates of letters received, however, hereafter I shall try my best to remember.

How is the weather in England? Have you had to smudge any yet? We had our coldest day (to date) yesterday.

Twenty eight (28) degrees outside - a good many of the plants wilted - & I almost felt as if I would too. Our apartment was some what warmer tho' - about 34°. We got our heaters this afternoon, but they have to be installed by engineers so as yet, all heaters are of no benefit to us. I suppose within the next 3 weeks they'll be up & ready to be used. At least I hope so.

I have thought over - very carefully, what you wrote in your last letter - and I have definitely decided to take instructions. I already spoke to Father Clement about it, and he said he would

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Come over (that was yesterday). But, he
must have been busy as he did not
stop by. I am nearly very much enthused
over the whole thing, and am looking
forward to Father Clement coming
over. He thought it would be much
wiser that he come over as he never
knows where he'll end up during the
day.

It looks very much as if my mind
has gone on the blink. I started three
letters to you - and it looks as if the
one is not much better. Perhaps it
would be wiser if I'd write again
in a few days.

How is Mr. Whitney and the Boys?
I hope very much you are not too
tired after having such a busy
week. My regards to the family &
to Mrs. Dougherty - please.
