TOTAL OF 733 MEN REGISTER IN DRAFT

Male Residents, 18-20, Comply With Selective Service Act

Center registration of 733 men between 18 and 20 years of age under the Selective Service and Training Act was completed last night, it was announced by the draft officials who were in charge.

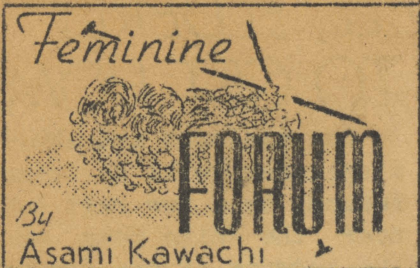

NEW TICKET SYSTEM HAILED AS SUCCESS

Close to one baby a day has been the birth rate at the Center hospital. "What now, little fellow?" you may ask.

A check-up with Dr. Norman Kobayashi revealed that a birth is recorded on a standard birth certificate with Arcadia as the birth-place.

The certificate then passes through the Los Angeles Health department, from whence it goes to the Bureau of Vital Statistics. The document, testifying to American citizenship of the infant, is placed in the hands of its parents before its discharge from the hospital.

Males have a slight lead in the births so far. Of the 58 babies born as we go to press, 33 are boys and 25 are girls.

We are proud to reveal that there have been no cases of infant or maternal mortality. Even a caesarean operation was performed because of acute emergency conditions beyond the normal.

The delivery was made by Dr. Tom Abe, assisted by others on the staff. Both mother and child are doing well at this writing.

The fiftieth child was born at the Center hospital last Tuesday. Named Akiko, she is the third child of Mr. and Mrs. Taketaro Enomoto. Mr. Enomoto is an issei and his wife is a nisei, both from San Diego.

Both workers and patrons are pleased with the new ticket system now being used at the White mess, the Mess committee revealed today.

Under the experimental plan, the waiting crowd is cleared in less than 10 minutes and the third group is assured of the same food which has been served to the others.

The schedule for those with No. 1 tickets is breakfast 6:30 a.m., lunch 11:30 a.m. and dinner 4:30 p.m.; No. 2 is at 7 a.m., 12 noon, and 5 p.m., with No. 3 at 7:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m.

A set of rules to clarify questions which have arisen was also released

by the committee:

1. Tickets will be rotated every two weeks.
 2. Loss of tickets are to be reported to the Information section of the Government house.
 3. Those wishing to take food to ill persons must have the invalid's ticket marked by the servers at steam tables rather than by door checkers.
 4. Waitresses will give second helpings, which may not be the same as the original entree, to assure following groups of the main dish.
 5. Old, disabled and infirm persons will be allowed to enter the mess hall through separate entrances.

ILL, ELDERLY TO GET HOME

Convalescent and elderly single men will be transferred to a new rest home near the White mess when the auditing of the Center's population is completed, according to the director of the Social service division.

The home will be under the direct supervision of the Medical and Social divisions and Capt. Masuo Kitaji of the Salvation Army, who proposed the plan, will act as administrator.

The washing and daily care of disabled men will be done by volunteer workers. Arrangements have been made with the Housing division to transport the workers to the laundry.

The rest home will be administered by the following groups:

Linen supplies and physical well-being, Medical service, Dr. Norman Kobayashi; selection and discharge, Social Welfare, Margaret Fujita; mental well-being, Spiritual committee, the Rev. John M. Yamazaki and Noboru Ishitani; tray service, Mess division; periodical inspections, Public Health and Center medical staffs.

UNBEATEN B TEAMS CLASH FOR CROWN

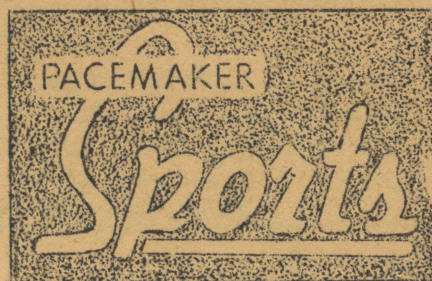
Huskies Tackle San Francisco

"You are receiving your diplomas of graduation from high school today under conditions never known before in the history of this country. Let us hope that such conditions will never need be repeated.

"This is commencement week and each of you should remember what that means. Graduation is only the beginning of a more useful and a happier life.....Abraham Lincoln...in his Second Inaugural Address...said: 'Let us strive on to finish the work we are in; to bind up the nation's wounds...to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and all nations.'"

The repertoire of the

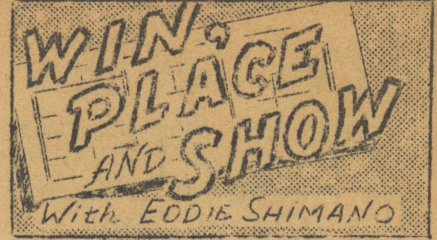
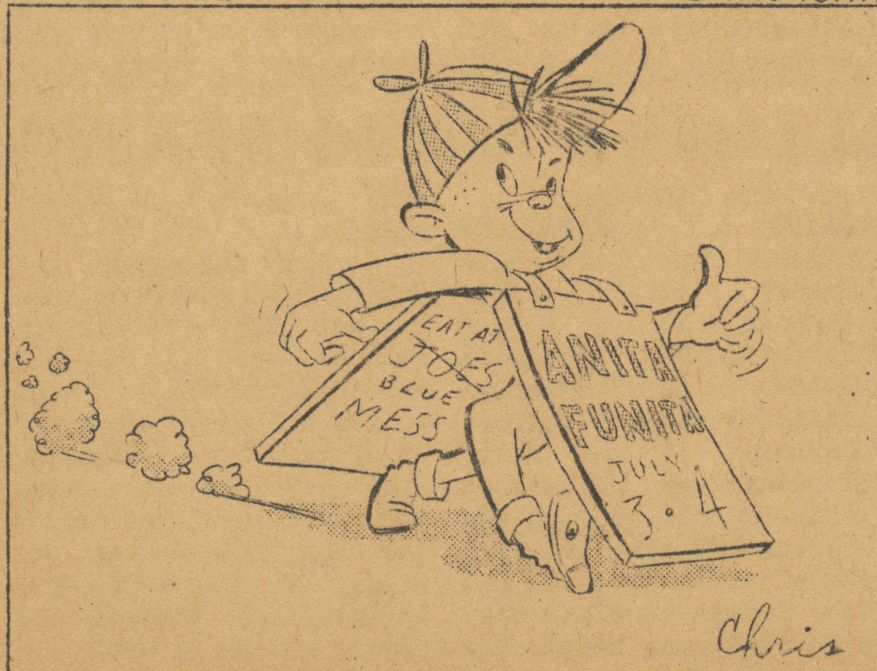
glee club is varied. One boy starts singing a song, any song, and they all join in.
