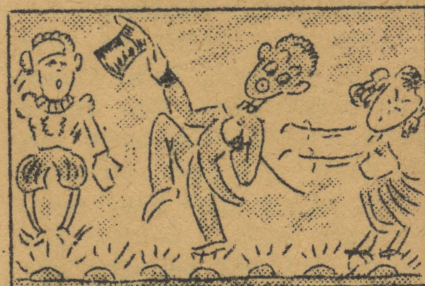

Speedball, a sport similar to soccer, will be added to the girls' athletics activities, the Recreation department announced today.

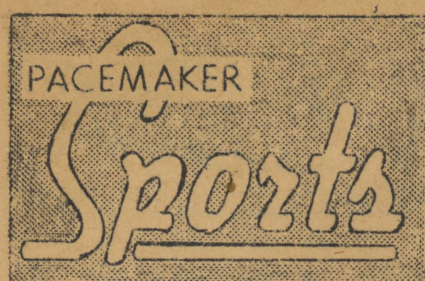
The games will be played on the grounds adjoining Recreation House 1, located north of the Anita Chiquita field.

Editorial

# Translate Beliefs into Action

Anti-semitism, that peculiarly fascist phenomenon, has a closer relation to Americans of Japanese ancestry and to their issei parents than most of us realize.

When the thoughtless nisei or issei makes the mistake of indulging in derogatory remarks about the Jewish people in general, or about any other racial minority group, whether it be Negroes, Mexicans or Filipinos, he is toying with a dangerous boomerang.

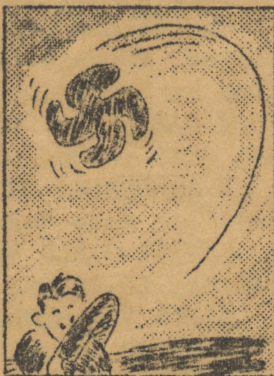
To indulge in any form of race-baiting is to play directly into the hands of the Axis. Any person guilty of race-baiting is participating in a definitely fascist act whether consciously or unconsciously. Sometimes a few of us may have erred along these lines in an unconscious fashion, purely from thoughtlessness and carelessness rather than from deliberate malicious intent.

Yet, ignorance is no excuse when a harm is done. Before one opens his mouth to make a critical remark about the "Jews," it would be wise to stop, count to ten, and ask yourself, "Is this true?" "Is this necessary?" "Is it discreet?"

This goes for making observations about any people of any race or nationality.

The building of a sound democracy is not only fighting abroad, but also putting into practice at home those principles which we profess to believe.
