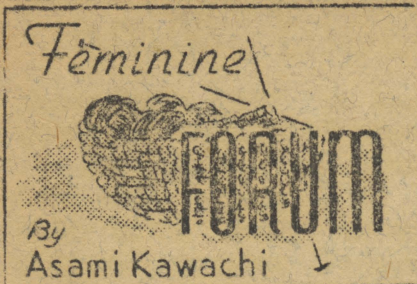

## CENTER DENTAL CLINIC RATED ONE OF BEST

Equipment valued at thousands of dollars, much of which is owned by staff members, makes Santa Anita's dental clinic one of the best of all centers.

The staff, headed by Dr. H. K. Kawamoto, handles

200 to 250 patients a day.

The type of work done by the clinic is limited by the United States Public Health service to emergency and preventive dentistry and does not include bridgework and fitting of dentures unless absolutely necessary for the health of evacuees.

The service does, however, include temporary filling of cavities, relief for toothaches, X-raying, treatment of accidental injuries and acute infections in the mouth and the repair of dentures.

The clinical equipment includes a complete set of surgical instruments, examining and plastic instruments and dental engines. --by Anna Sakaizawa.

All business normally conducted in any bank is handled in the Center at the local branch of the Bank of America, R. L. Walker, manager, stated today.

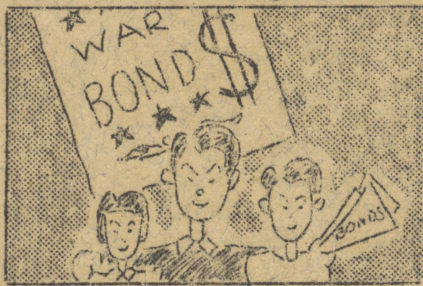
He also asked residents to note that the bank is open every Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9:15 a.m. to 3 p.m.

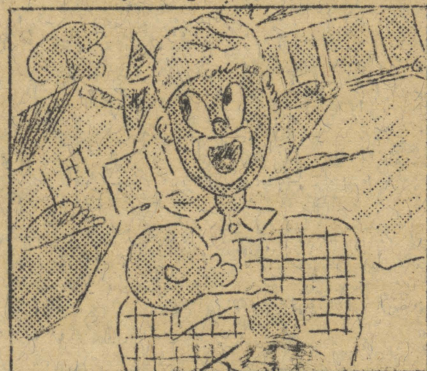
## GIRLS HAVE 'JAM' SESSION

The C division will be a hot and messy scramble by enthusiastic but not top-flight players who are out for exercise.

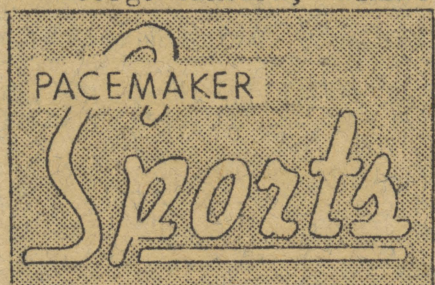

Basketball's coming to Santa Anita!

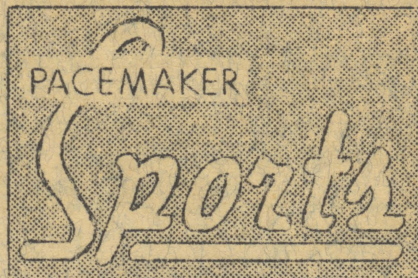
With the completion of basketball courts on the Anita Chiquita field, the Recreation department today advised all players to form teams and select managers as elimination tournaments will start Aug. 24.

## Editorial

# Victory Through Second Front

In the evening of July 22 of this year at Madison Square park in New York, a crowd of 60,000 persons, previously cautioned not to interrupt with applause, sat tensely listening for fourteen minutes to the voice of Charles Chaplin as he spoke to them by telephone from Hollywood.

The occasion was a rally to support President Franklin D. Roosevelt for the immediate opening of a second front to hasten the final victory over Hitler and the axis.

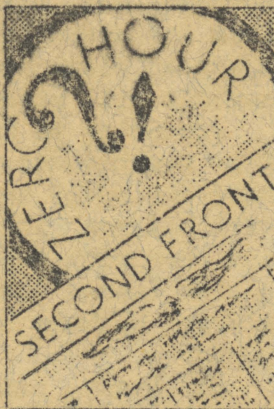
The rally, after hearing messages from many other prominent Americans, sent a letter to the President pledging every needed sacrifice to carry out his policies to win the war.

This was no attempt, as appeasers and isolationists have implied, to dictate military strategy to those military leaders now charged with the responsibility of winning a victory for the United Nations.

Chaplin, in his telephone message, says, "In the Allied Nations there is a difference of opinion as to whether a second front is possible now. We hear that the Allies haven't sufficient supplies to support a second front. Then again we hear they have. We also hear that they don't want to risk a second front at this time in case of possible defeat. That they don't want to take a chance until they are sure and ready.

"But can we afford to wait until we are sure and ready? Can we afford to play safe? There is no safe strategy in war...Note, official Washington and official London, these are not questions to create dissension. We ask them in order to dispel confusion and to engender confidence and unity for eventual victory. And whatever the answer is we can take it."

We, too, can take it--whatever the answer--if the answer will lead to democracy's victory over fascism.
