AUBURN, CAL., RUMORS CLARIFIED

TELETYPE RECOUNTS EXPERIENCES OF DOIS

The following teletype was received by Project Director Ray D. Johnston Jan. 20 from R.B. Cozzens, assistant director, WRA, San Francisco, Cal.:

"In view of rumors, newspaper and radio accounts of 'incidents' at Auburn, Calif., involving returnee

Sumio Doi, his father and mother, here are the facts - Doi family returned from Granada to own farm January 5. Return was without incident until night of January 17 when Doi heard noise in outbuilding. Investigation showed hoodlums had started

small fire which was promptly extinguished by Doi and father. Incident was reported to Sheriff's office. Following night buskshot was fired toward house from shotgun in hands of unknown person on road. Sheriff was summoned. His investigation showed several sticks of dynamite planted in packing shed. Governor Warren and State Attorney General Krmny, appraised facts, immediately requested full protection for Doi family, followed up with conference with Placer County Superior Court judge, Sheriff and District Attorney who assured protection. Dois immediate neighbors are friendly, extending help. Merchants in Auburn are cooperative. Doi family will feel happier when other friends have returned to area.

"Shigeishi Kubo, Gila River, after exploratory trip to Penryn, near Auburn, found situation friendly in that vicinity, has returned to Rivers to bring his family to Penryn. Story on Dois problem played inside pages of Chronicle, page 1 in Call-Bulletin and News and not run by Examiner. All papers played up order of National Commander Scheiberling of American Legion ordering restoration of 15 names to Hood River Posts Honor Roll and protested 'Bigotry Race Hatred.' These are the facts."

proceed with their plans. According to word from the Eastern Defense Command, which now has jurisdiction over both the eastern and southern restricted zones, excludées currently residing in the Atlantic and Gulf coastal areas will not be required to move. West Coast exclusion, however, is being continued on the same basis as heretofore.

POST EXCLUSION BUL⁴

Part 2 of Post-exclusion Bulletin No. 4 follows:

STUDENT ASSISTANCE

The question has arisen whether students who accepted indefinite leave in order to attend educational institutions outside the centers and who did not at that time receive any relocation assistance are entitled to such aid in the future.

Inasmuch as such students are on indefinite leave, they will be entitled only to the same assistance as other persons on indefinite leave - in other words, transportation from their present point of relocation to the State from which they were evacuated, if they have an approved relocation plan. If students expect to assist parents or other relatives in relocation elsewhere, such plans should meet his family at the new

point of relocation rather than returning to the center. If the relocation is on the West Coast, the student may obtain transportation on the same basis as other relocated evacuees and route it via the center.

In hardship cases and where it is evident that the student's return is essential to aid the relocation of other members of the family, it may be possible for the field officer to obtain transportation assistance from the local welfare agency through the Resettlement Assistance Program. Conferences are now in progress with the Social Security Board on this and other phases of administration of the Resettlement Assistance Program and information will be forthcoming soon.

EASTERN-SOUTHERN RESTRICTIONS

Word has just been received from the War Department that the eastern and southern restrictions now included in the individual notices to excludées will shortly be rescinded. Pending receipt of further notice from the Western Defense Command, excludées not now in the eastern or southern coastal areas should be advised to defer any plans they may have for settling there. After they have been individually notified that the restrictions no longer apply, they will of course be free to

ONCE OVERS

The recent Auburn "threat" incident parallels one that happened at Santa Rosa, Calif. An evacuee returned there last month to check on his farm and discuss lease renewals. His tenants received him cordially, and one of them invited the Nisei to stay overnight with him. But the latter received an anonymous phone call, warning him that if the evacuee were not out of the house that night, it would be burned down.

A little shaken, the Nisei went to San Francisco and conferred with WRA assistant Director Bob Cozens. Ex-newspaperman Pat Frayne, now handling WRA public relations on the Pacific coast, knew the district attorney at Santa Rosa and phoned him about the matter. The D.A. said he was pretty sure he knew who were trying to scare the Nisei out and assured him that they were not going to succeed. He asked the evacuee to return to Santa Rosa and walk down the town's main street.

So, accompanied by WRAs property supervisor, the Nisei returned to Santa Rosa and strolled down the main stem, while the WRA man waited in an automobile. Of course, nothing happened. The threats were merely threats.

無期出所であるが故に彼等學生が一般人同様無期出所援助を受け得る事は當然である。據言すれば、彼等の再転住計画が承認されてゐる場合、転住先の現住地より彼等が立退き来たつた州への交通の便と云ふ事に當る。若し學生が両親及家族の転住を援助爲さんとする場合は、転住所へ迎へに歸るより、再転住先へ出向いて、金合する方がよい。又、再転住地が西部沿岸なる場合は、學生は他の転住立退く同様の原則に基いて、転住所經由の旅程に於ける交通の便が考へられり。

諸種の困難に伴ひ且つ家族の外部転住にその學生が転住所に滞留の必要明白なる場合、地方転住支局負は再転住援助計画を、とほして地方社会救済部より交通の便に關する援助を受け

る事が出来る。此の問題及再転住計画執行上の諸相に關して社会保証局の會議は進行中である。此の間の消息は近日中に発表の豫定。

禁制品に關する諸法令の改訂

立退令廢止の布告は西部防衛管轄内の諸州に於ける日系人の寫眞器短波受信機を含む諸種禁制品所持を禁ずる。公布第三号をも廢棄する事に付た。然し大統

領令第二五二五号及歐国外人を對照とする禁制品に就いての司法省の諸法令は依然として有効である。轉住局は申請があれば、転住所内の二世に彼等の寫眞器返還を援助するものである。此の寫眞器返還の申請をなす者は之が一世代にとりては依然として禁制品であり如何なる状態に在りても二世が一世代に之を使用させる事は法律違反である。事實を忘れてはならない。短波受信機は未だ全轉住所内に於て転住局の法則として禁止されてゐる。然し當局は短波受信装置を除き、餘の事と約し所長の下に於ては所長住民への返還を許可しつゝある。
