LODI SGT. NOW LIEUT.

Receives Battlefield Commission

WITH THE SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE--S/Sgt. James Hajime Kurata, from Lodi, Calif., was recently commissioned to the rank of Second Lieutenant on the battlefield somewhere in France.

Lt. Kurata, an artillery forward observer of the 522nd Field Artillery Battalion, 442nd Combat Team, won his commission during the unit's drive with the 36th "Texas" Division in the Seventh Army's push through the Vosges Mountains of Northeastern France. It was during the bitter fighting in the Vosges that the Combat Team made the heroic rescue of the Lost Battalion of this war in the thickly wooded forests of near Bruyeres.

In Italy, Lt. Kurata's unit, then attached to the famed 34th "Red Bull" Division, fought in the Allied Drive from north of Rometo and across the Arno River.

Before his induction in Sept. 1941, at Sacramento, Calif., Lt. Kurata was an engineering student at the College of Pacific. Prior to coming overseas, he was stationed at Camp Shelby, Miss.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenji Kurata, reside at Block 28-4-E. His younger brother, Fred, is also overseas.

WRA LIST SHOWS MANY CENTER CASUALTIES

A WRA compilation of casualties to soldiers who have been in or whose next of kin have been or are presently in a center up to January 26 shows that such cases total 113 killed, 358 wounded and 16 missing in action. War Department releases disclosed some 15 killed, 90 wounded and 5

In order to have initial contact with Center families to acquire family information and wishes and determine needs in regards to relocation, the Relocation division and Social Welfare sections have been

missing in action whose families or themselves were men-evacuees or voluntary evacuees since no records show they were ever in a center.

Minidoka tops the list with a total of 85 casualties. Tule Lake's numbered 18; Rohwer's, 17 killed, 28 wounded, 3 missing.

IS CAUTIONING CRT. VISITORS

Families in the Center who expect a member or friend to return for a visit should precaution such individuals to wrap and tie suitcases securely to prevent theft of contents.

The IS suggests a n outer covering of cardboard tied with rope. Several cases have occurred where incoming suitcases have been opened and items stolen.

BLOCK SUGAR ALLOT'T REDUCED

Center residents will feel the effects of the new OPA regulation reducing the amount of sugar for civilian use as block allowances will be cut accordingly, reported D. J. Hudson, project steward.

Under the new order each person will be allotted five pounds of sugar every twelve weeks or six and two-thirds ounces per week. The Mess section asked residents to comply with the new regulation as much as possible.

In order to check on whether clothes, curtains, or cabinets have been placed near the stove, an inspection tour of all units was begun yesterday morning.

SANTA ANA, CAL., FOUND TOLERANT

Los Angeles--The five members of the Nitta Family, the Shokukas and the Hitoshis, are back on their farm near Santa Ana and "pretty happy about the whole thing."

Things seem to be going well, Mitoshi Nitta reported in a "thank you" letter written to the WRA office here recently, several weeks after the return

of himself, his wife, their child, his father and mother from Poston Center.

"We had a very good trip and since our return are slowly getting settled," wrote young Nitta. "So far we have had a warm welcome by everyone except some farmers, all of which I believe you know about. All of the business houses in Santa Ana have welcomed our business except one farm implement firm. Two other equipment firms have greeted me very cordially, and I have already done business with them. I already contacted a blacksmith in my neighborhood and have had business with him. Therefore it looks as if my farm machinery will be cared for. So far our farm labor has been plentiful.

"There has been no difficulty in marketing our produce. A friend of mine, who is a farmer, has offered to market my produce should conditions become so difficult that they would prevent me from doing so. However, he did not think that such a condition would ever exist. I do not think that such a thing will happen either."

NOZAWA ASKS COOPERATION IN STRAY ANIMAL DRIVE

Tamotsu Nozawa, chairman of the Board of Health, announced to the Block Managers yesterday that a drive would be conducted Saturday afternoon, Feb. 24, to pick up all stray dogs and cats which have not been identified by their owners and vaccinated for rabies.

Nozawa urged that everyone cooperate in order to eliminate a possible menace to the health of the residents, particularly the children. The people in each block will round up the stray animals and after they have been collected, the Internal Security will be notified to pick them up and exterminate them.

All residents willing to pay higher admissions prices to see MGM productions are urged to postcard their opinions to the Movie Dep't immediately.

In accordance with district regulations, MGM movies may be shown only at these prices; 12 cents for children and 18 cents for adults, including taxes. Under these prices only MGM productions will be shown. Films produced by other studios will be held at the present rates.



Following the evacuation, a good many of us found consolation in the thought that the people of the Pacific coast would miss us after we were gone. "Just wait till their vegetables become scarce," we said. "They will wish we were back then."

And as reports filtered back to us in the centers that the fruit stands, once stacked high with fruits and produce, were now empty and forlorn, we nodded our collective heads knowingly and said, "You see?" We heard that the once-fertile truck gardens were lying untended and neglected, without the guiding genius of the Japanese to manage and work them, and that the wholesale markets were barely struggling along without our help.

Matters weren't helped any by our hometown friends writing to tell us that they were finding it increasingly difficult to get their favorite vegetables. We read such letters and felt an odd, inner satisfaction. We didn't stop to realize that produce was scarce everywhere, not just on the coast. So we believed the reports, smiled smugly, sat back and waited. When the Exclusion was lifted, we rubbed our hands expectantly in blissful anticipation.

Now I don't wish to disappoint anybody, but the truth is; the people on the West coast haven't missed us so much. Of course, our friends have missed us, but they have missed us because they are our friends, not because of shortage of vegetables. Before we go any further, let me say that I am not against returning to California. On the contrary, I'm very much for it. But cold facts are irrefutable. And these, my friends, are cold facts.

Jan. Figures Show Library Patrons Average 320 Daily

The Rohwer Community library has increased its patronage since moving into the new building, according to January statistics. The children's department in lending 2,845 books in January set a new record for the present fiscal year, while the library as a whole showed a gain in circulation of almost 20% over the monthly average of the previous six months.

During January, a spot check of attendance indicated that an average of 320 persons use the library daily, including children and adults in almost equal numbers.

A table has been reserved for relocation reading. Special bulletins, newspaper reprints, magazine articles, issues of the OUTPOST, atlases, pamphlets on the states and cities and regional areas to which evacuees have relocated, and the United States Guide Books are available there.

(Continued from Page 3) in southern California is sewed up tighter than a drum, and returning evacuees will have a really tough time reestablishing themselves in it. Bill Kuni-shima, who has just returned from a three-week trip to Los Angeles, says that the whole produce industry there, from grower to retailer, has been taken over and being run on a larger scale than ever before under the Japanese.

There are more acres under cultivation now in southern Cal than ever before. One reason for it is that the growers have so much money on hand that they are reinvesting it in land. But the big reason is that the tremendous profits they are reaping mean tremendous taxes. And rather than give the money to Uncle Sam in the form of taxes, they are putting it into more land and more production.

Mexicans and Filipinos, who were mere farm hands under the Japanese, are now operators and doing considerably more than well. They own fine homes, nifty cars, and live sumptuously. Until recently, some of

them were cleaning up as much as \$7,000 per acre on celery and other produce. Lately, however, two factors have figured in curbing such fabulous profit-making. One was that the OPA stepped in and slapped a ceiling on produce. And the second was that competition from Japanese-grown produce in Arizona, Utah, and Colorado has tended to keep prices down.

The wholesale markets are also going full blast. Here, too, the former Mexican hired hands are now operators of commission houses and stalls. And they are doing a landslide business. A casual observer might never know that an evacuation had taken place and that the Japanese were no longer around. There is no evident scarcity of produce on the market, either, it seems.

Dave Beck's Teamsters' union has come out flatly for barring Japanese from membership. And since that is the bargaining body that has the Los Angeles produce sewed up, there is little or nothing that the evacuees can do on that score right now. Some of the wholesale houses have

indicated a willingness to hire evacuees, if the union would consent. But there is no way of knowing whether they really mean that, or whether it's another tongue-in-cheek remark, made in the secure knowledge that the union would not permit it.

Even the retail fruit stands are operating as of yore, with the produce displayed just as neatly and trimly as when the Japanese operated them. There are no empty stores on street corners, no mismanaged markets begging for the Japanese to come back and show them how.

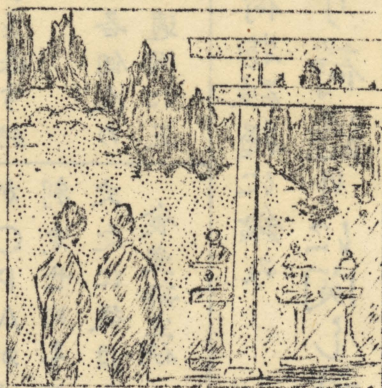
The whole picture isn't a very encouraging one, I'll admit. But it is not as dark as all that; individual initiative still pays off handsomely. The Japanese "controlled" about eighty percent of the produce industry in Los Angeles before the war. If anybody thinks that's going to be the case again, he's lulu. But we can at least get back into the business. After all, this is still a free country, in spite of Dave Beck and his Teamsters.

西部防衛地区の

立退者と禁制品

四五年一月廿日発表の民間制限令に依り立退者は西部防衛八州中何れの地点にても左記物品の使用及所有を禁ぜられたる。

- 一、火器を含む武器。
- 二、弾丸、爆弾及爆発物。
- 三、無線電信器或は其の部分品。

この法令は市民及外人立退者全般に亘り下記八州に於て適用せらる。

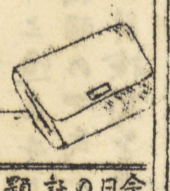
