## CONFAB MAKES RECOMMENDT'NS TO WRA, MYER

Convening from Feb. 16 to 24, 29 delegates representing seven of the eight relocation centers met in Salt Lake City, Utah, to discuss and draw up statements and recommendations for consideration by National Director Dillon S. Myer.

Main appeal was for maintaining the relocation centers for the duration of the war and some time hereafter operating under the present WRA policies. Ten statements of the present and 21 recommendations concerned mainly with relocation and property matters were drawn up.

## Team Completes Center Hearings

Having completed their work, the remaining members of the original Army Team of five which arrived here in Dec. 1944 to hold hearings for those whose resettlement status had not yet been determined, Major Jack Morgan and Corporal Bern Schult will both return to San Francisco within a few days to continue similar work.

Major Morgan expressed appreciation for the cooperation given the team during their stay.

A rehearing board will arrive from San Francisco in order to arrange rehearings for those requesting them.

A hostel to provide temporary housing has been opened by the American Friends Service Committee and the Presbyterian Church at 506 Evergreen Avenue, Los Angeles, 33, Calif. (Telephone: Angelus 5373).

Requests for reservations should be addressed to the directors, the Rev. Sohei Kota or Miss Esther B. Rhoads. Reservations are not valid without the approval of definite dates. Guests are asked to bring their own sheets, blankets, towels and ration books.

Those who are employed, or who remain longer than ten days, will be charged \$1.50 per day for room and board. Unemployed persons are charged only \$1 per day for the first ten days.

## No Deportation Fear For Aliens

The Naturalization and Immigration Service has advised the War Relocation Authority that there is no danger that Japanese aliens will be deported from this country because of acceptance of public assistance of any type. It was pointed out that aliens who have been in this country more than five years cannot be deported for this reason.

Moreover, even if an alien has accepted public assistance within five years after coming to this country, he cannot be deported unless it is shown that the cause or reason for need for public assistance existed before he came here.

The Distinguished Service Cross, posthumously awarded to T/Sgt. Ted T. Tanouye for extraordinary heroism on the Italian front before he was killed in action on Sept. 4, was presented Friday to his mother, Mrs. Momoye Tanouye of 16-1-F, by Col. G. C. Graham, commanding officer of Camp Robinson, Ark.

On July 7, 1944, in Italy T/Sgt. Tanouye exemplified the finest traditions of the U. S. armed forces when he led his platoon in an attack to capture the crest of a strategically important hill and took the objective after single-handedly silencing enemy positions.

**EMPLOYMENT:****MESA ORCHARDS WANTS 60**

The Mesa Orchards located at Mesa, Idaho, offers to employ from 50 to 60 Japanese evacuee workers on a permanent basis. Permanent family housing is available with year-round employment. Women and children may work picking apples, in the packing plant and the dehydrating plant.

Housing consists of nine 4-room cottages and 39 two-room cabins equipped with running water, sinks, wash basins, and facilities for cooking. There is a public school in Mesa and Japanese American students will get the best treatment with no tuition charges. High school students are now going to Council High School, 8 miles from Mesa, with no tuition charges and good wages for 60¢ per hour for all males and 50¢ for children and females. During the apple picking season, wages are paid on the piece basis. Garden space is available.

With their motto "In serving others we serve Christ," a new club, The Besteens, has been formed under the sponsorship of Roberts Best.

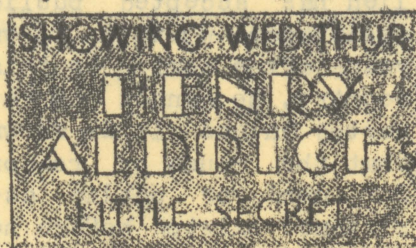

# CAL. C.I.O. APPROVES RETURN

The California CIO Council in executive session in Oakland, Cal., on Jan. 14, 1945, adopted a resolution approving the return of loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry to

the Pacific coast.

The resolution follows in part:

"The California CIO Council in executive session in Oakland, Jan. 14, 1945, recognizes the re-

cent order of the War Department and the War Relocation Authority permitting the return of loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry to the Pacific coast as a commendable and correct step; one in line with the principles for which this war is being fought.

"In view of the established fact that thousands of our Japanese-Americans are now serving their country with honor and distinction on the battlefield, we believe that such action as taken by the American Legion, Hood River, Ore., in erasing the names of Japanese from the honor roll of World War II veterans, should be condemned as regrettable and unjustifiable.

"The experience of our country since Pearl Harbor has been that these Americans of Japanese ancestry have proven themselves responsible and loyal Americans, participating in all phases of the war. As such they are entitled to as much protection under our constitution as any Americans regardless of race, creed or color.

"The California CIO Council further calls upon all public officials of State, County and Municipal governments and all people of this State to do everything within their power to cooperate with the War Department in order to assist in the readjustment of these loyal Japanese Americans to our community life."

## FILE DECLARATION OF 1945 ESTIMATED TAX

Washington, D.C.--About one out of every five taxpayers must file a Declaration of Estimated Tax for 1945 not later than March 15. This is in addition to the filing of an income tax return for 1944, according to Joseph D. Nunan Jr., commissioner of Internal Revenue.

Declarations are required in general from business and professional people, landlords, investors and others who expect to get more than \$100 of income this year from sources outside of wages from which tax is withheld, and who expect that their total income from all sources will be \$500 or more.

A declaration must also be filed by a wage earner who expects to earn this year more than \$5,000 plus \$500 for every exemption except his own. For example, a wage earner supporting two dependents must file if he expects to earn more than \$6,000. However if a person expects more than \$100 of income outside of wages from which tax is withheld, he must file a declaration regardless of the size of his wages.

The majority of wage earners are exempt from filing declarations, for the reason that their taxes are kept substantially paid up by the tax which is withheld from their wages every payday.

Declarations also are required from farmers who expect to have \$500 or more this year, but farmers--meaning persons who get more than two-thirds of their income from farming--may postpone their 1945 declarations until Jan. 15, 1946.

A March 15 declaration should be accompanied by a payment of at least one-fourth of the tax estimated to be due over and above any tax being withheld

from the taxpayer's wages. The remainder is due in equal installments on June 15 and Sept. 15, 1945, and Jan. 15, 1946.

Special forms and instructions for the making of declarations have been mailed out to all persons who filed declarations last year. Additional copies are available at the office of any collector.

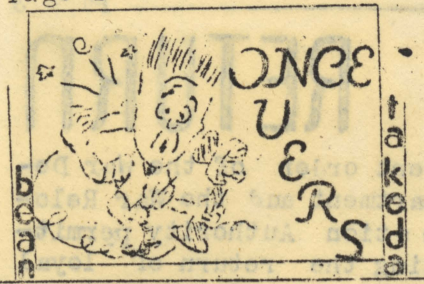

Heart-touching vignette; an elderly Issei mother sent her soldier son overseas a telegraphed money order for \$150. But for some reason, it never reached him, and the mother finally asked the telegraph company for a refund. The company had trouble tracing it. The mother showed a batch of letters from her son to show he did not receive the money. Finally, the telegraph company notified the mother that it would refund the full amount of the money order. But along about the same time, the War Department sent her a wire saying that her son had been killed in action in France.

A former Seattle nurseryman, now at Minidoka, feels pretty low these days. His wife returned to Seattle to look over their things stored there, and she found nearly everything stolen, over ten thousand dollars worth. Items included; tools, garden hoses, flower shop accessories, washing machine, sewing machine, beds and furnishings, bicycles, clothing, electrical appliances, refrigerator, curtains, shades, and even jewelry locked in trunks. She appealed to their attorney, who was agent for the property. But he refused even to talk with her. WRA is looking into the matter.
