



CITATION TO UNITS OF 442ND RECOGNITION OF ACTION IN ALSACE CAMPAIGN

PFC. REPORTED AS PW IN GER.

Pfc. Harry H. Kuroiwa, reported missing in action in France on Oct. 19, 1944, is prisoner of war of Germans, his wife, Mrs. Kiyo Kuroiwa, 25-9-C. was notified this week by J. A. Ulio, the Adjutant General.

Pfc. Kuroiwa is from Berkeley, Calif., where he was a nurseryman. He is 30 years old and has a baby daughter whom he has never seen.

The awarding of a Presidential Distinguished Unit citation to units of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team was revealed in a press dispatch, passed by the field press censor of SHAEF (Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Forces), the Pacific Citizen reported on Mar. 3.

The awarding of the Distinguished Unit Citation to the Japanese American group was disclosed in a routine dispatch which reported that 1st Lt. Edward J. Nilges, Fairview Village, O., had been pro-

moted to the rank of Captain with the 442nd.

The article declared that "it was during the Alsace campaign that Captain, then Lieutenant, Nilges acted as the plans and operations officer for the Japanese American Task Force which received a Presidential Citation as a Distinguished Unit for smashing the German main line of resistance in that sector."

(This report is the second on the awarding of a Presidential Distinguished Unit citation to a Japanese American unit of the U.S. Army. The 100th Infantry Battalion, now incorporated as part of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team, was awarded a Presidential Citation for action near Sasseta, Italy, in June, 1944.)

DELEGATES FROM CHINA TO VISIT

A delegation of Chinese officials will visit the Rohwer Relocation Center, Project Director Ray D. Johnston announced today. They will arrive the evening of March 15 and remain until the afternoon of March 18.

The delegation includes R. K. Cheng, acting director of the Department of welfare, Chi Kuo, director of Personnel Administration, P. C. Sun, director of Labor Control, and C. C. Yang, representative of the Ministry of Economic Affairs.

These men are in this country as result of a cooperative arrangement between United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration and the Chinese Government. Their purpose in visiting the center is to study various aspects of administration in connection with caring for large groups of dislocated people. This group is part of a delegation of approximately 40 Chinese who are in the United States to study conditions arising from the war.

Drive Slated from Mon.-Sat.

With March designated as Red Cross month, Rohwer will do its share toward attaining the 1945 national goal of \$200,000,000 when the Center Membership Drive gets underway Monday to culminate Saturday.

The Drive among the evacuees will take place in each block where two representatives aided by the block manager will accept the contributions. Simultaneously, the Drive among the Caucasians will progress under the chairmanship of Ed Bethune.

The 1944 Roll Call netted some \$2,053 from 1,758 evacuee members and \$656.58 from the 121 Caucasian members.

At the end of the month, the Rohwer Red Cross will issue a souvenir pamphlet with pictures of Rohwer to each member.

SO. TASK FORCE

Activities of a Japanese American task force on the southern sector of the Western Front in breaking a two-day stalemate along the main line of German resistance in the Vosges mountains was reported in a Washington dispatch of the United Press in January.

This U.P. report told of the action of units of the Japanese American Combat Team in routing out at least three battalions of the enemy and paving the way for the liberation of two strategic lines. The Japanese Americans killed 80 Germans by small-arms fire, with 200 to 350 more dead Jerries who were probably killed by artillery fire. Fifty-six Germans were taken prisoner.

The U.P. report stated that the Japanese American task force suffered only three casualties, two of which were only slightly wounded.

GIVE GR. LAKES FARMING OFFERS

Lee Marsa of the Great Lakes Area will arrive Monday to visit the Center.

He plans to stay approximately two weeks. He will bring with him offers from the Great Lakes Area, particularly in the field of farming.

PHILADELPHIA TRUCK FARM OPPORTUNITY FOR FAMILIES

Twenty miles northeast of Philadelphia there is a truck farm opportunity for five or six large families.

There are 550 acres in this farm, 275 of which are irrigated by pressure system. Housing is furnished and there is running water and electricity. There is a huge eleven room house for three or four families; another house for two families.

Guaranteed to average fifty hours a week the year round. Pay to fifty to seventy-five cents hour depending on work performed. A ten per cent bonus of profits will be divided among the employees. Crops grown are chiefly celery, white turnips, parsnips, carrots, radishes, spinach, parsley, endive, napa.

There is a greenhouse, 24 x 120, available for use of workers in the winter time for which no

charges will be made. After the first year, there are opportunities for share cropping.

There is a free bus to the grade and high schools. Hospitals are available seven miles away in a city of 10,000.

This offer must be taken immediately or else someone else will take it, reported Charles Price. All have an opportunity to make an appointment to see Charles Moon at the Relocation Office, 42-2-E.

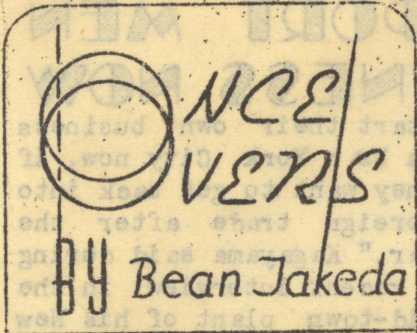

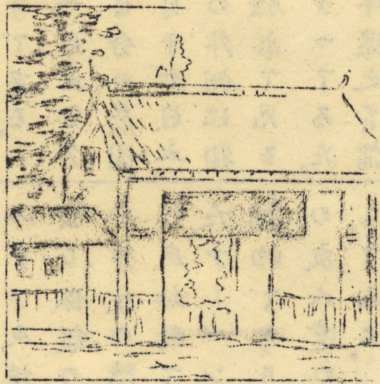

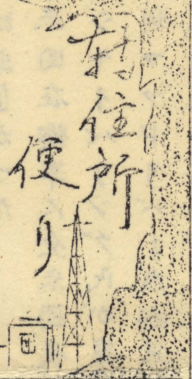
