

Dr. Thomas Fujiwara Returns to Practice

After spending the past nine years on the mainland in pursuing his medical studies, Dr. Thomas Fukuio Fujiwara returned here yesterday on the Matsonia, and is expected to open his practice here shortly.

Graduating from McKinley high school in 1929, Dr. Fujiwara attended the University of Hawaii for three years before leaving for Tulane university in New Orleans in 1932.

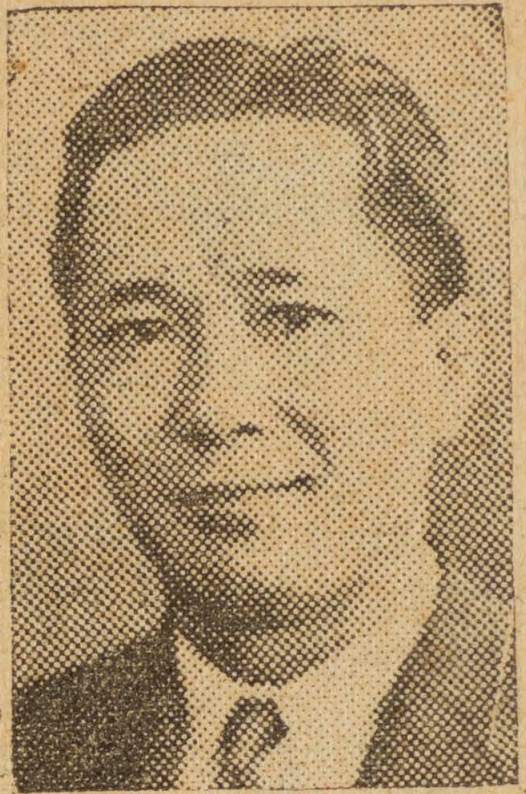
He received his M.D. degree from Tulane in 1936, and received a

Dr. Fujiwara two-year fellowship in pathology at the Lakeside hospital of the Western Reserve university in Cleveland, O., passing his national medical board examinations in 1938.

After spending another year with Cleveland City hospital, he became connected with the Pratt Diagnostic hospital and the New England Medical Center, both of Boston, during the next two years, serving as instructor in medicine at Tufts Medical school at the same time.

He was graduated second in his class at Tulane, and was admitted into Alpha Omega Alpha, national medical honorary fraternity.

Dr. Fujiwara is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Shuji Fujiwara, owners of the Shunchoro teahouse, Alewa Heights.



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Lindsay Rated Ahead of David, To Meet Dalma

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The highest national ranking bantamweight to have ever fought in Honolulu makes his island debut tomorrow night at the Civic auditorium.

He's 20-year-old Kenny Lindsay who is rated No. 2 bantam of the world in the latest issue of Ring magazine. David Kui Kong Young holds No. 3 rating in the same division.

A protege of Jimmy McLarnin former world welterweight champion, Kenny has had but 21 professional fights to date. Out of this he has won 12 bouts by knockouts.

Winning the National Golden Glove bantam title in 1940, Lindsay jumped right in with the top ranking bantams as soon as he turned pro. He has never fought a four rounder since turning pro.

Kenny is Irish all through. Not only in nationality but also in action as rail birds who've seen the Canadian in action will tell you.

A stiff two-fisted puncher, Lindsay likes to crowd in to his foe and force the fight.

He hasn't met Dalma professionally but has seen the Fil battle in action against Nat Corum in San Jose some months back.

"Dalma's a good boxer," admits Kenny.
