I have received money (\$15⁰⁰) and all the things you sent in the suitcase. Also received yours of the 19th and read it carefully. I trust you received money from Dougo Co., as I wire informed you, and out of the amount you got, I want to repay Mr. S. that \$25⁰⁰ which he says he paid for me as December rent to Richanbach. Tell him "I thank you". As to my office, I am determined to keep it under any circumstances. Therefore, I want you to see Mr. Richanbach and pay him \$50⁰⁰ from part you get from Dougo Co. This fifty dollars, ^{is} to pay for two months rent, ~~from~~ ^{for} January and February. I wrote Mr. Richanbach yesterday, stating that Mrs. Koyama will bring to him said amount and that it is my intention is to keep my offices as ever. As Mr. Richanbach told you, Mr. S. has never a lease; but I have the lease, and so I believe that Mr. Richanbach now clearly understand concerning my ^{decision} ~~intention~~, under the present situation.
