Whereas Cedric Hardwicke's Japanese lines were difficult to understand, Guinness speaks intelligibly in the Nip ponese language.

The credit probably belongs to Guinness's application to the role -he is a stickler for authenticity -as well as to the influence of Bob Okazaki who served as Guinness' dialogue coach on the picture. Okazaki also was dialogue teacher for Marlon Brando when the latter played Sakini in "Teahouse of the August Moon."
