IDAHO EDITORIAL CONFIDENT VOTERS WILL PASS 'SJR 1'

Measure Would Repeal Anti-Oriental Voting Law in State Constitution

BOISE.—The Idaho Statesman expressed confidence in its Jan. 16 editorial, "Due for Discard", that the Idaho electorate would repeal the provision of the state constitution barring naturalized citizens of Chinese or Mongolian descent the right to vote or serve of juries. The text of the editorial follows

Due for the Discard

There's one consideration in particular that quite likely influenced war veterans who are members of the American Legion when, in a Ninth district convention at Payette last Saturday. they went on record unanimously in favor of repeal of a provision of Idaho's state constitution which denies to naturalized citizens of Chinese or Mongolian ancestries the right to vote or serve on juries.

That consideration, of special interest to war veterans, is the memorable record of Americans of Japanese ancestry under extraordinary stress and strain during the second World War. It's a record of loyalty and devotion and sacrifice that was dramatically climaxed by the amazingly heroic performances of the historic "Go for Broke" battalion on the fighting front.

The Legionnaires' action must, of course, have been influenced, too, by the longtime, peacetime record of these Americans of alien ancestry that's characterized by competence and diligence in their own affairs and by a spirit of cooperation and good neighborliness in the affairs of

the community and state. It's interesting that this declaration by the Legionnaires at Payette preceded by only a few hours a regional meeting at nearby Ontario of members of the Japanese American Citizens League which was apprised of the veterans' action immediately after the League's national president had sounded a warning that discrimination "creates a tremendous amount of problems and weakens the moral fiber of




