### SEATTLE JACL'S HUMAN RIGHTS SERIES ENDED

Final Speaker Talks on Meaning of 'Personal Involvement'

SEATTLE-In the closing section last month of a three-part JACL program on human relations chaired by Philip Hayasaka, Seattle Human Relations Commission executive director, Walt Hundley, local chairman for Congress of Racial Equality, spoke on "Personal Involvement".

Hundley spoke in place of City Councilman Wing Luke, missing since mid-May in a plane crash. Personal involvement was defined as carrying out convictions

into everyday life-not just civil

rights but all issues at every level.

#### WATCH THE SANSEI GENERATION'

That was the title of a study of the cultural traditions and acculturation process of Japanese Americans by George A. DeVos, Ph.D., associate professor in sociology at U.C. Berkeley, which appeared five years ago in our Holiday Issue. About five weeks ago, an unusual request came for 100

as a service to a JACL youth conference. The DeVos research, which included first-hand observations in Japan, relates old traditions being revitalized and blended into the new life by the Issei as well as their effect upon the Nisei.

"It will be interesting to watch how the third generation of Sansei interact and continue some of their Japanese heritage," DeVos says in conclusion. "They are facing less discrimination and strangeness than was true for the Nisei and other ethnic groups of a previous period. The Sansei does not experience to a similar degree the sense of rejection and discrimination felt by many Nisei which found dramatic climax in the Evacuation experience undergone during the war.

"Our society has somehow grown up since then, and Americans of Japanese ancestry will find less outer hindrances to individual accomplishment than has been the case with their parents.

"The question remains will they find as much within themselves to inspire them and set for themselves goals and aspirations toward which they will strive."

And what were some of these traditions DeVos men-

A knack for getting along in group efforts and cooperating toward accomplishment of some goal. Though the Issei were basically "rural," as farmers they were not strictly peasant (illiterate and traditionalistic) but industrious and cooperative (the complex irrigation system in agricultural Japan demanded cooperation among the villages).

A reluctance to recognize individuals who try to put themselves in the forefront as leaders. The Japanese social organization de-emphasized overt exercise of leadership in rural communities. It still persists among Nisei leadership who exercise "enryo" (respectful hesitancy) in coming to the forefront.

A cleverness with hands, in manipulating small things. A. Japanese tradition manifest in children's games and exploited in Japanese industry helped to develop the high degree of agricultural skills. "Japanese methods" have influenced the total farm picture in California.

Respect for scholarship, scholarly productions and the whole concept of education. Value of the educational ladder as a means of getting ahead is found even in the most rural communities in Japan. The Issei were already influenced by the universal education which had been promulgated after the restoration of the Emperor and its importance was impressed upon the Nisei. (Educational background of the Nisei is about three years more than the national U.S. average or the 11th grade.) Issei traditions also placed a great deal of status and respect upon "sensei" (teacher) and "hakase" (doctor)—values originating in China which the Samurai class long held.

Very little cause of friction within the Japanese family over religious differences among family members. This religious tolerance stems from Buddhism and Shintoism, which tolerated differences of beliefs. Most Buddhists sects see no need to proselyte. Today, Nisei have converted to various forms of Christianity, though their parents have not. Organized religion did not have central importance for the Japanese as was true for many of the European immigrants to America.

Precepts of art that were old by 1600 in Japan are now looked upon everywhere as very modern and advanced. Appreciation for Japanese canons in taste is becoming widespread in America and in Europe. Though the Issei artists were few in number, many Nisei have been encouraged in an attempt to recapture their artistic traditions indirectly.

The constructive nature of family life, its cohesiveness in face of stress. DeVos considers this the most important of traditions. Virtues of filial piety (an emphasis of Confucian tradition that formed the basis of Japanese family life) and respect for elders, importance of the family over the individual (i.e.; in arranged marriages), "on-gaishi" (strong sense of obligation by children for parents to try repay them for the hard work and sacrifices they had undergone for them), and role of the eldest son (because he would continue the family line and obligations) all made the Issei attitudes of life in society very different from other ethnic groups coming to America. Such cohesiveness of the family has kept Japanese Americans within themselves, good citizens as far as the social community was concerned and showing an amazing lack of delinquency despite the prejudice and discriminations against them as a minority group.

These traditions will be further analyzed by the JACL-UCLA Japanese History Project. But in view of the sketchy review of DeVos's study here, perhaps we should have honored the request to have it reprinted for the Sansei who are interested now in some answers to-who am I? We could have saved the type and published a pamphlet from itthereby inaugurating a PC Reprint Service. The Nisei might also appreciate the same to better understand their relationship with the Sansei with respect to traditions brought over by the Issei.



## From the Frying Pan

Denver, Colo.

THE DAY IT RAINED - From all indications, Denver's unprecedented flood received a good deal of notice countrywide, but there wasn't much clear explanation as to what happened. To understand this flood, and that which followed on Colorado's eastern plains, it is necessary to know about our pattern of rainfall. Our rain, what we have of it, often falls in massive cloudbursts. Incredible amounts of it pour out of the skies in a few hours.

That is what happened last June 16. This cloudburst was concentrated in an area about 25 miles south of Denver. Within minutes it filled Plum Creek, normally no more than a trickle, bankfull. A wave of water plunged down the creek bed, washing out bridges, uprooting trees, destroying highways, flooding farmland and sweeping away houses. Plum Creek ran its short and turbulent course and joined the South Platte River, which winds through Denver.

Meanwhile, Denver itself experienced hardly any rainfall. The airport weather bureau reported about a half inch. Many parts of the city received scarcely enough to dampen sidewalks. But the flood from upriver was advancing on the city. It inundated the lowlands, largely an industrial, warehousing and substandard housing area. This area took a brutal beating, but the rest of Denver was untouched.

Not so with farming areas downstream along the Platte from Denver, and in the valley of the Arkansas River in Southeastern Colorado. Rich farmlands on the banks of both rivers were swept clean of crops and left blanketed with a heavy cover of grease-like silt that soon will become nearly as hard as concrete. Some Issei and Nisei farmers were among those virtually wiped out, although it is not known for sure at this writing how many.

TRADE SHOW -- The Japan Trade Center in San Francisco brought a merchandise show to Denver not long ago. In view of the variety of products Japan is selling in the United States, the show was disappointingly small. Still, it made an interesting contrast to another Japan Trade Center show here about ten years ago.

Back then, the bulk of the exhibit was made up of soft goods-textiles, handicrafts, paper products, and such items as glass and porcelain. This time the emphasis was on durable goods and precision items-motorcycles, pianos, cameras, electronic goods, watches, with a sprinkling of the old line products. In this regard the show reflected the change in the Japanese industrial picture.

GRADUATION — Our small community, whose various factions rarely see fit to cooperate with each other on anything, assembled long enough this month to honor its Sansei high school graduates at a banquet and dance. The highlight was presentation of scholarships totaling more than \$1,000, no small sum for a community as small as ours. Denver's Mayor Tom Currigan addressed the gathering, which is an indication of the regard in which he holds the city's Japanese Americans.

The academic and extra-curricular accomplishments of each of the Sansei honored underscored the fact that as a group they have not lost their Nisei parents' diligent study habits, but in addition, they are far more active in outsideclassroom functions than their folks ever were.

After the banquet the younger set indulged in what passes for dancing these days to the accompaniment of music calculated primarily, it seems, to test the durability of the human eardrum and the public address system. Witnessing and auditing the bedlam, I felt more than somewhat behind the times until I heard a Sansei of no more than 21 years remark:

"Boy, these kids are way out. We didn't have anything like that when I was their age."

Being a Japanese American has its trying moments. I guess every one of you has experienced moments such as the following:

Because of your obvious physical features, you're immediately recognized as an Oriental. Very often people will come up and ask if you're from Japan. When you say you were born here, they say, "No wonder you speak English so well; I mean, without an accent!" Others will come up and ask you if you're Chinese or Japanese, just out of curiosity.

Many Caucasians have never seen or talked to an Oriental before. I once had a roommate from a small Wisconsin town who said that I was the first Japanese American she had ever seen. Thank God she didn't stare and gape at me as if I had two heads and a tail.

Caucasians who have been to Japan are extremely friendly and anxious to tell you of their trip to Japan or to show off a smattering of the Japanese language. The number who have been to Japan and who really enjoyed themselves is unbelievable. One friend said that she attended a Japan-America Society of Washington meeting once and was the only Japanese person there. She was also the only person there who had never been to Japan. It's rather emparrassing when everyone else talks about his trip and expects you to have experienced the same thing simply because of your racial heritage.

For some reason, Japanese Americans who have never been introduced to each other may never make the move to introduce themselves. They may live in the same building, or ride the same bus every day, or know something about the other, but they will rarely make the friendship gesture. In fact, when they see each other, they turn the other way, or look up or down as if preoccupied. It sounds ridiculous and childish but it happens every day. I'm guilty

After a while you become reconciled to the whole business. Sometimes these moments can even be pleasant. Rather than shying away from people who come up to you, starting a conversation or smiling can make you friends at least for the moment. Most people are trying to be friendly and mean no harm.

Distinguished Leaders, Educators, Nisei Have Reviewed Applications

As applications from 50 chapter candidates for the 1965 Pvt. Ben Frank Masaoka Memorial Scholarship undergo scrutiny of a preliminary evaluation this week, the thought came to see whom the judges were in the past.

No mention of judges is made in the Pacific Citizen for the first three years. In 1946 and 1947, the awards went to combat Nisei veterans returning to their studies.

In 1948, the award went as the top prize of the national JACL oratorical contest at the Salt Lake cinvention.

From 1949, the Masaoka scholarship took on the format as we have it today, the award going to the most deserving Japan se American nominated by a JACL chapter graduating from high

#### Utah University Professors

Until 1952, the judges were various faculty members and officials at the Univ. of Utah. The late Elmer Smith, associate professor in anthropology and author of the "JACL Story" published in the Pacific Citizen in the 1950s, chaired the selection committee.

After National JACL Headquarters moved from Salt Lake City to San Francisco in 1953, the judges were selected from the city by the Golden Gate. Community leaders and educators comprised the pauel for the ensuing three years, making the judges aware of the scholastic and leadership records of the up and coming Sansei genera-

In 1956 the first all-Nisei panel of scholarship judges was organized. They were active in various phases of San Francisco community life.
