In fact, when the sister cities tie was established, there were many Issei who had to admit they'd never heard of Takayama and had no idea where it was.

It is called "Hirohito, Emperor of Japan." The author is Leonard Mosley, a British journalist, and the Accent on Youth: Alan Kumamoto publisher is Prentice Hall. Mosley could not have written the book without the assistance of highly placed Japanese. Judging from the four chapters I've read so far, they told him a great many things about the imperial family that most people have never heard. It makes for fascinating reading.

Emperor Meiji, Hirohito's grandfather, is portrayed as a great hand with the court concubines, his father Taisho a madman whose illness led to plotting and counter-plotting among the court nobles. Even Toyama Mitsuru, the sinister super-patriot who headed MEETINGS, MEETINGS the Black Dragon Society, is given mention. Mosley reports Toyama played no small role in blocking the effort, by members of a rival clan, to break Hirohito's engagement to Nagako.

But the book is not simply a collection of court there are going to be gathgossip-although there is some of that. Hirohito is portrayed as a very human and quite likable captive of tradition and a system that moulded him into the imperial pattern, a young man who, when he said he did not believe in his own divinity, was persuaded to turn his energies to the pursuit of marine biology.
