

The first group of immigrants from Japan arrived through the Port of San Francisco in 1869 and settled near Coloma in El Dorado County, and Silk Farm Colony which only lasted two years.

This humble beginning has been recognized by the Japanese in America who, in the subsequent 100 years, have made many and great contributions to the Nation in spite of persecution, discrimination and travail unprecedented in American history.

The inaugural event of JA-CL's Issei centennial celebration is the dedication of the State Historical Landmark plaque at the Gold Hill Elementary School June 7, near the grave of Okei-san, a member of the Wakamatsu colony, and the banquet at Sacramento's El Dorado Hotel that evening.

A gala JACL celebration climaxing the centennial is scheduled in the late fall at Los Angeles.

# Chopsticks, Technology and Racism

Once upon a time in the United States, the properties of Orientals were looted and burned, the Chinese were lynched, the Japanese were arrested and placed behind barbed wire compounds, and laws were enacted that sys-
