

JACL came of age in the '40s, when it had to provide the leadership for the Japanese American minority on the continental mainland at a time when the national enemy was the land of their ancestry and when greedy interests utilized wartime prejudice to subject them to such treatment as no other American nationality had ever been forced to suffer. Subsequently, it had to forge a decent future for those of

Japanese origin in the United States. JACL matured into a successful advocate of those of Japanese ancestry in the '50s, as federal, state, and local legislature, executives, and courts abolished the Three Nisei among special legal and practiced circumscriptions that restricted the lives and destinies of those of Japanese origin in the land of their citizenship and provided 1,400 Americans consideration and opportunities that few would have even dared dream of just a decade earlier.



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
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Cleveland mayor lauds Issei
