Bannai wins special Assembly election

LOS ANGELES - Voters in Los Angeles County's 67th Assembly District have elected Paul T. Bannai (R-Gardena), the first Japanese American ever elected to the California legislature, finals returns of the June 26 special election showed.

The 52-year-old Gardena city councilman for a year and a half and member of the city planning commission two years prior (one year as its chairman) polled nearly 55% of the votes cast. About 22% of the voters turned out.

When the polls were closed at 8 p.m., the tally of absentee ballots was announced, 218 for Bannai and 173 for Rupert, and in the four subsequent announcements, the Delta (Colo.)-born Nisei maintained the initial 55% lead. By 10 p.m., bulk of the votes were counted from the 105 precincts within Gardena, Lawndale, and parts of Torrance, Redondo Beach, Hawthorne and Compton.







Aztec legends told of the coming of Quetzalcoatl some 800 years before the Spaniards arrived, and this would make it somewhere in the neighborhood of 500 A.D. Quetzalcoatl is said to have brought to the Mexican people knowledge of irrigation and agriculture, a calendar system, measurement of time by astronomical calculation, metallurgy, mining and polishing of pre- Nai Boardcious stones, and idolatry-all known to Chinese civilization of that time.

Equally interesting is the way Miss Mertz traces the explorations of Hwui Shan from Point Hueneme, north of Los Angeles, to the Kingdom of Women near what is now the Mogollon Mesa, then northeastward to the Black Gorge (the Black Canyon of the Gunnison) not far from snow-capped peaks (the Rockies).
