

Cleveland Almost a year ago, I was asked to write a paper on the cultural impact of minority group patients, especially Asians, on mental institutional care vis-a-vis alternative care programs. A fancy title to reflect the notion that Asian Americans, because of their strong family ties, may be less inclined to use the more "traditional" forms of psychiatric treatment. Furthermore, that there may be a need to develop a different "model of care and treatment" that takes into account cultural values.

Researching the subject of mental health and Asian Americans turned out to be disappointing. With few exceptions. I discovered no pertinent contemporary articles on the subject, despite the knowledge of increasing incidence of mental health problems among Asian Americans.

Several studies, corroborated by others who have investigated the differential use and response to psychiatric treatment among white ethnics,

reported a significant finding. Minorities of color and lower socioeconomic groups of white ethnics tend to place greater reliance and confidence on somatic treatment (medication, shock therapy, etc.) than psychotherapy (verbalization, rap sessions, etc.). There may be many obvious reasons for this, but the cultural patterns of ethnic groups may be an important factor. For example, the feelings toward authority, the reticence to openly share personal problems with ones peers, the general orientation to overt, concrete behavior as opposed to introspective behavior may reflect cultural values and patterns.

PC OPERATIONS & POLICIES

To enable chapter officers and delegates to the JACL National Council gain a better understanding of the scope of Pacific Citizen operations and policies, a PC Manual was published in 1966 and since then revised or updated by the PC Board. In lieu of the PC Manual and Budget will be the 1974 PC Board proposal summary for our 1975-76 operating budget.

As of this writing, the revisions to the tentative budget prepared for the last National JACL Board meeting Feb. 22-24 at San Francisco are not complete-but were included in the summary due at National Headquarters last week (April 27).





one year and with a tuition scholarship, he worked last summer to earn enough money for his dorm fees and living expenses.

Last summer the rules were changed to say he needed proof of support for four years or \$16,000. Last month, the Immigration & Naturalization Service ruled all foreign students will no longer be able to have summer jobs.

"The decision to withhold authority from school officials to act on foreign student requests for summer work permission is intended to protect work opportunities for American youths," including Vietnam veterans and minority groups," said a letter sent to area colleges from the Seattle immigration district office.

Eugene Lai, past president of the council, speaking to a room packed with Asians, Pakistanis, Arabs, Africans, Polynesians and Europeans, feared the ruling seemed to b an attmpt "to control limit and maybe drive out the foreign students". That would lead this country to isolationism, Lai added.





The climbing season officially closes Aug. 31 while mid-July to mid-August is considered the best period to negotiate the fullday ascent.
