SAN FRANCISCO - On the steps of the old federal courthouse at 7th and Mission St., Iva Toguri d'Aquino returned this past week (Nov. 17) to publicly deliver her petition for a Presidential pardon via San Francisco Postmaster Lim P. Lee. The mail was addressed to the U.S. pardon attorney in Washington, Lawrence M. Traylor.

Iva was accompanied by her attorney, Wayne Collins, son of the late Wayne M. Collins who represented her for 25 years. The event was widely covered by the media. The talk shows in the San Francisco Bay Area that evening were also supportive of her third attempt to seek restoration of her citizenship, stripped from her when she was

convicted of treason in 1949. But the case was "a political one", her attorney had noted in the previous petition filed in 1968 and unanswered. 

Katherine and other missionary teachers sailed first to Shanghai and waited there until they could be picked up by an American military transport.
