



She exposes the full extent of the American government's persecutory policy towards the Kibei, the Joint Chiefs of Staff directive calling for "all Japanese residents of the Hawaiian Islands" to be concentrated in U.S. mainland camps; documents relating to hostage-reserve and revealing high-level thinking in regards to postwar deportations, etc.
