JACL national with Clinton

JACL President Denny Yasuhara and about 20 others representing minority groups and women attended a White House conference July 14 on affirmative action

with President Bill Clinton, Chief of Staff Leon Panetta, and top aide George Stephanopoulos.

Doris Matsui, deputy director to the president, extended the invitation from the White House to Yasuhara to attend the event.

The purpose of the meeting was to obtain

community input prior to the president's scheduled announcement of his review of affirmative action by his task force on this subject.

Yasuhara and Michael Lin, president of the Organization of Chinese Americans represented Asian Pacific American (APA) concerns. In total, there were two APAs, two Hispanic Americans, six African Americans and nine Caucasian Americans, including two from the Jewish community.

Among participants were: Ralph Neas, Leadership Conference on Civil Rights; Eleanor Smeal, National Organization of Women; Myrlie Evers Williams, newly

JACL message: Keep affirmative action in California education

Is school out on affirmative action? As the University of California Board of Regents prepare to decide the fate of affirmative action admissions policies in the University of California school system, JACL has called the policies necessary to maintain a level playing field for all people.

Denny Yasuhara, JACL national president, said, "If we accept the proposition that it is important for a country such as America to have diversity in its leadership, then some means of affirmative action must be utilized. Our academic institutions are the foundations of our country and they must graduate people who reflect the diverse views of its constituency and I submit that we are part of that constituency as are women and all people of color."

Gearing up for a bid for the White House, California Gov. Pete Wilson was planning to preside over a meeting of the University of California Board of Regents in San Francisco scheduled for July 20, according to a

Los Angeles Times report. Regent Ward Connerly has proposed eliminating race and gender-based preference in UC admissions and hiring and contracting as of Jan. 1, 1996. Rev. Jesse Jackson has said he and others will attend the meeting and engage in civil disobedience.

JACL members mixed business with cordial get-togethers and lively exchanges at the July 7-8, 1995, bi-district conference in Boise, Idaho.




Denny Yasuhara, JACL national president, said that JACL has to work harder at recruiting and retaining members to prevent future deficits.

Speaking July 8 at the Intermountain-Pacific Northwest bi-district meeting in Boise, Yasuhara urged chapters and districts to maintain their commitment to JACL.

"If we are to get our financial house in order, the National Board cannot do it alone. We must have the active participation of everyone," said Yasuhara.

Earlier in the day, the chapters of both IDC and PNW committed themselves to increasing chapter membership.








After Wang acquittal, investigation of 'Friendly Fire' incident launched

Following the recent acquittal of Air Force Jim Capt. Wang, Congress has decided to launch an investigation into the April 14, 1994 downing of two U.S. Army helicopters over Iraq which kill- CAPT. WANG



ed 26 people. The hearing has been scheduled for July 27 at 10 a.m. in 2118 Rayburn House Office Building.

Rep. Robert Matsui had initiated a May 3 letter to Rep. Robert Dornan, chair of the Subcommittee on Personnel, that was signed by six other members of Congress who represent families of victims in the accident. The letter urged the Subcommittee to investigate the "friendly fire" incident.

"This is the justice that we have been demanding for the bereaved families of the 26 men and women who perished in Iraq," said Matsui. "Now their voices will be heard. I hope that this Subcommittee hearing will force changes in military operations so that future tragedies like this will be averted."

Capt. Wang, who was in Washington to meet with congressional staffers, said he felt an obligation to work with Congress on the hearings so that a similar friendly fire incident will never occur again. Wang said that the jury at his court-martial courageously decided not to punish him despite the Air Force's attempt to scapegoat him for the shootdown.

"I'm not bitter and I will carry on with my Air Force career," said Wang.

Maj. Lawrence Tracey, the AWACS mission crew commander, called Wang "an honorable young man who put his career on the line." The crew commander said Wang's acquittal exonerated the AWACS crew. Wang was the only person involved in the incident to be brought up for a court

martial. Wang said, "Given the information we had, I can't see any way we could have done anything different."

Wang identified three problems that led to the shootdown: inadequate training of the AWACS, F-15, and helicopter crews; outdated rules of engagement; and lack of interoperability between the Air Force and Army. He said no one should have been court martialed for the shootdown, but someone should be held responsible.

Frank Spinner, Wang's attorney at the court martial, said that the families of the victims upset, not at the Wang acquittal, but at the lack of accountability and legal recourse against the Air Force.

"Sec. (of Defense William) Perry, (Brig. Gen. Jeffrey) Pilkington (commander of Operation Provide Comfort Combined Task Force), and a pilot all said they were responsible for the tragedy, but then why was only Capt. Wang prosecuted? Congressional hearings are the only forum for getting answers," said Spinner.

Wang said Spinner is on the witness list for the July 27 hearing, but in fact he is not. However, he said he would be available to assist the committee if necessary.

OCA supports investigation

The Organization of Chinese Americans said they were encouraged by the announcement of a Congressional hearing into the friendly fire incident over Iraq which killed 26 people.

"Now that Capt. Wang has been acquitted, the next step is a Congressional investigation to prevent such tragedies from occurring in the future. We are heartened that the House National Security Committee is taking some action to do so," said Dr. Michael C. Lin, OCA national president.

Daphne Kwok, OCA executive director, said, "The Asian American community is not only concerned about the scapegoating of Capt. Wang, but also that the military is held accountable for its actions. We will continue to monitor Congress to ensure that this issue is not glossed over but is addressed in depth."

OCA recently held a fundraising dinner in Washington for Wang's legal defese fund.

Seattle Chapter president and is currently serving as a representative in the Washington state legislature.

Tokuda (D-37th Legislative District) is as a member of the state legislature representing the most ethnically and socio-economically diverse district in Seattle. Among his committee assignments are correctgions, children and familys, and transportation.

Among his key legislative initiatives are a higher education expenditure bill which revised laws to allow state institutions of higher learning to keep unspent allocations as reserve funds; a measure which increased funding for guardian program for abused children; and budget language to restore state funding for refugee programs.

Tokuda is past president and an active member of the board of directors of the Seattle Chapter, JACL. During his tenure as president, he instituted reforms in the operations of the organizatiaon and led efforts to broaden its relationship with other civic and ethnic groups.

Washington state legislators will resume their duties when the session reconvenes in January, 1996.

■ JACL headquarters: The district unanimously voted to support the naming of Karyl Matsumoto, currently JACL office administrator at San Francisco headquarters, as interim national director through Sept. 30, 1995. The final decision will be made by the National Board.

■ Washington, D.C., representative report: JACL Acting Washington, D.C., Representative Leigh-Ann Miyasato made a presentation to the National Board at its May 6-7, 1995, meeting. In his review of Miyasato's report, Yamada remarked that affirmative action may become the biggest issue facing this country and JACL as well. The organization will be discussing and dealing with its position on this critical

■ May 6-7, 1995 National Board meeting: In reviewing the minutes, Yamada made note of a report by Cynthia Campbell, chief executive officer and president of Professional Exchange Services of Fresno, Calif., who is serving as a consultant to JACL. Yamada emphasized that even though disagreement exists over JACL's finances, the National Board has "a fiduciary responsibility to know what's going on." Campbell had said in her report that records need to be centralized, and retrieved and analyzed with relative ease, he added.

Yamada noted that Campbell also provided without charge a follow-up document outlining recommendations for future actions, which included streamlined procedures and suggestions for computer software.

Yasuhara announced that Travis Nishi, Central California District governor, Fresno Chapter, and Yamada would serve on JACL's Ad Hoc Budget Committee.

Regional election: Aaron Owada, Olympia Chapter, and Connie Masuoka, Portland Chapter, were named co-chairs of the Nominations Committee. PNW candidates will be identified and announced later. The election will be held at the last meeting of the district in the fall.

■ Education: Don Maekawa reported that the Seattle Education Association has been meeting regularly with the chapter to prepare a workshop for teachers scheduled for Aug. 16 at chapter headquarters. (See story page 5.)

Maekawa said that the sponsors are hop-

ing to show the video, "Personal Justice," with the possibility of Gordon Hirabayashi in attendance. Another video, "Honor Bound," which documents the Nisei veterans of World War II, is also being considered.

The purpose of the workshop, Maekawa, said, is to provide accurate information for teachers and give personal history that is localized to the Northwest region.


■ Legacy Fund Grant Committee: Two committees have been formed, one led by Lillian Kimura of the New York Chapter and another by June Arima Schumann of the Portland Chapter. After meeting with local members to discuss grant proposals, the two chairs will discuss them and develop a single list for review.

Pacific Citizen: Schumann, who is PNW representative to the Pacific Citizen Editorial Board, reported that the newly reconstituted PC Editorial Board has held two teleconferences this year. Their principal work has been the development of the PC Editorial Guidelines that were presented to the National Board.

Schumann informed district members that Mae Takahashi of the Clovis Chapter was named to succeed Cherry Kinoshita of the Seattle Chapter, who had resigned as chair of the PC Editorial Board for personal reasons. Schumann praised the long-time JACL member for her diligent and loyal service.

Kinoshita remarked that the change from the board's general oversight to the oversight of editorial matters only has been unworkable in practice.

Youth: Kelly Wicker of the Olympic Chapter reported that the Youth Handbook is still undergoing review. Once com-

Mori said that Mt. Olympus currently has \$25,000 in the bank from the convention, with a portion going back to national.

Asked to make comments on having a successful convention, Mori said, "Make sure you have enough money to have the convention."

He noted that most of the main events had corporate sponsorship which helped offset costs.

"We started working early on. It's a good way to get the chapter together, it created fellowship and cohesion within the chapter and between the chapters," said Mori.

■ JACL headquarters: IDC voted unanimously to support Karyl Matsumoto's selection as interim national director at JACL headquarters.

■ Education: Hero Shiosaki, Pocatello/ Blackfoot Chapter, told the IDC meeting of the success he has had in getting the Japanese American curriculum guide and other educational materials into the local schools.

Through Shiosaki's efforts, the video "A Personal Matter: Gordon Hirabayashi vs. the United States," has been added to the libraries of Vallivue High School, Caldwell, Idaho; Blackfoot High School, Blackfoot, Idaho; and Snake River High School, Blackfoot, Idaho.

In a letter, Colin Clough, social studies department head, said, "I believe that every student should be made aware of the story of 'A Personal Matter.' Several times during their education it could be very

helpful. It has been the single most important media we have introduced in our history department."

Pacific Citizen: Bob Endo, Pocatello-Blackfoot Chapter, submitted a resolution to the IDC council to support increasing JACL membership dues to return Pacific Citizen to a weekly. In Endo's resolution he requested that IDC support a "review of rules and bylaws to enable JACL to raise dues and fees through a poll whether through mail, phone or electronic (fax) to conduct operations in a fiscal manner prudent to today's business world."

The motion was referred back to Endo to resubmit at the next district meeting as a amendment change to the JACL bylaws.

Yas Tokita, IDC PCEB member, reported recent developments at the PC including the resignation of Cherry Kinoshita, Seattle Chapter and the appointment of Mae Takahashi, Clovis Chapter, as chair of the PC Editorial Board.

On serving on the PC board, Tokita said, "I felt it was a great opportunity to interface with other JACL members. If given the opportunity to serve in this capacity you should. It's good to hear the perspective of other districts."

■ Topaz Museum: Larry Grant, Salt Lake City Chapter, reported on the May 27 dedication of the Topaz museum in Delta, Utah. He said that among the artifacts is a restored barrack placed in the front of the museum. Grant noted that among the media who have come to visit the Topaz site were a camera crew from Japan taking footage for a morning news show.

■ Next district meeting: It is scheduled for Nov. 4 in Jackpot, Nev. District officers will be selected at that time.

Boise Valley Chapter helps Korean beating victim

"This tells us we need to be more aware and involved," said Ed Hirahara, president, Boise Valley Chapter, JACL, after reporting of a beating last year of a Korean American in Moscow, Idaho.

Chong S. Cho, 40, a graduate student at the University of Idaho, was attacked Nov. 4, 1994 by Curtis Steiner, 25, who brutally kicked Cho from behind, breaking his leg in two places.

During the attack, the Coeur d'Alene *Press* reported that Steiner was laughing and asking, "Are you Judo? Are you Judo?"

Hirahara told the Intermountain District meeting July 8 that he has contacted Karen Yoshitomi, regional director, Pacific Northwest, and Karen Narasaki, executive director, Asian Pacific Legal Consortium, for their assistance. The Boise Valley Chapter president said he thought the sentence for Steiner was lenient, who was sentenced to 18 days in jail on a

misdemeanor battery charge and ordered to pay \$27,000.

The Coeur d'Alene Press reported that Cho felt the attack may have been racially motivated. Steiner said in his defense that he had not meant to hurt Cho, char-

childish, adolescent prank."

Police investigators initially thought the attack was racially motivated. Judge William Hamlett agreed with Steiner's testimony that race did not play a factor in the attack.

acterizing his actions as a "stupid,

Hamlett said that the standard sentence in this sort of attack is six days, but that he increased it to 18 days as a lesson.

"You may think it was a prank, but that's not what anybody in this room thinks. You went looking for someone to knock down, you were being predatory," said Hamlett.

Hirahara said that Cho, who is going through oral examinations, has had difficulty paying for the

large medical bills stemming from his injuries.

"He tried to contact lawyers, but they said they wouldn't take the case because the people who committed the crime had no money," said Hirahara.

Also Hirahara told the IDC group that because Cho was the victim of a crime and not an accident, his insurance company would not cover his medical bills. The Boise Valley Chapter has been assisting Cho, a naturalized citizen, who is considering moving back to Korea.

Speaking to the *Press* shortly after the trial, Cho said that he was haunted by memories of the attack and still in pain because of his injuries.

"The doctors think it will get better, but there's no guarantee. So while Steiner was out working and walking around for three months, I've been home in pain barely able to walk," said Cho.

The Seattle JACL Education

to many teachers in the Seattle area, according to committee member Elaine Akagi.

help teachers use the guide
effectively.

The topics covered will include information on the historical background of the in-

ternment, personal stories, resources and lessons for elementary and secondary school teachers. Teresa Maebori of Philadephia, national JACL education chairwoman, will be one of the presenters.

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High bail for Nikkei is violation of civil rights, says IDC chapter

Troy Shiozawa of Pocatello is set to go on trial Aug. 22 for allegedly stabbing his step-daughter in a case which has raised concern among local JACL chapter members that Shiozawa's civil rights are being violated.

Hid Hasegawa, Idaho Falls Chapter, and Hero Shiosaki, Pocatello/Blackfoot Chapter, in separate district meetings, reported that normally bail for such a crime would be set at \$50,000 (maximum) but that the judge set Shiozawa's bail at one million dollars.

Hasegawa, who attended a preliminary hearing on the case, said, "Shiozawa was charged with three counts of aggravated assault. Bail should not have even been set at \$50,000. Hopefully it won't have to go to trial, which has been delayed three times."

Hasegawa explained that the prosecutor asserted that Shiozawa exhibits paternalistic behavior typical of a Japanese male. The Intermountain District and the JACL National Board have both passed motions supporting the civil rights of Shiozawa.

Jeff Itami, governor, Intermountain District, reported on the incident which are in dispute, including the severity of the injuries to Shiozawa's step-daughter and whether the incident was an accident.

Shiosaki said that Shiozawa's family are members of the Pocatello/Blackfoot Chapter and that the whole experience has been very trying for them, because of the intense local media coverage of the case. The chapter is currently organizing a defense fund for Shiozawa.

Snake River Chapter video available

The Snake River Valley Chapter, JACL, is offering a video which explores the chapter's history and legacy.

"Snake River Chapter JACL:
The Legacy Continues," includes taped interviews with Nisei members, reflecting on the role of JACL over the past 50 years as well as Sansei expressing their vision for the future.

Randy Harano, former IDC governor, said the project was a good way of preserving the chapter's history. He said that the local KAID-TV, the local public broadcasting station, is considering putting a program together from the chapter footage.

In addition to the video, Ted Takatori, president, Snake River Chapter, reported the results of a questionnaire on local and national JACL activities.

cruited new members 15 to 20 years ago, they joined because they had something to offer JACL. Now the trend has changed. They say, what can you (JACL) offer me?"

During the roundtable discussion, chapter members talked about various activities and programs which bring in many people.

Aaron Owada, Olympia Chapter, said the reason many young people do not join JACL is because they do not feel affected by racism.

"Many people don't feel they've been the victim of discrimination. People who have had it happen feel differently. They feel that if it can happen to me, it can happen to anyone," said Owada.

The two districts came up with

programs and events that attract members to JACL. Among the chapter activities listed include: social activities like Christmas dinners, crab feeds, salmon bakes, casino nights; networking, civil rights and cultural events like bon odoris and festivals.

The reasons for joining national JACL included: civil rights, credit union, news, health insurance and having a political voice.

Floyd Mori, Mt. Olympus Chapter, said that he has started personally contacting local Nikkei who aren't involved in JACL and urging them to participate.

"There is no doubt that the future of our organization is in increasing membership. What we're looking at are different approaches to increasing members. I don't think one plan or consultant will be able to tell us what to do," said,



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
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JACL National Singles Convention offers social events and workshops

Wilson, speaking on the news program "Face the Nation," said, "I think young people of all races in this state are gifted with native intelligence if we afford them an equal playing field."

The governor, who has announced his candidacy for the presidency, serves as president of the UC Board of Regents, but has not attended a meeting since 1992, according to the Times. Wilson has pledged his support to an initiative which would eliminate affirmative action proposed for next year's ballot and signed an executive order eliminating affirmative action from the state's executive branch.

Reacting to the presidential

politics, Yasuhara said, "It is unfortunate that Gov. Wilson in his quest for the presidency is willing to sacrifice UC's affirmative action admission system. Contrary to his rhetoric, if we are to maintain a level playing field, this program must not be allowed to be dismantled."

The JACL National Board at its

May board meeting voted to support affirmative action in college admissions.

UC President Jack Peltason and the nine UC chancellors have all gone on record supporting affirmative action in the UC system.

"My position is clear, as is that of the entire academic and administrative leadership of the university," said Peltason. "Our affirmative action and other diversity programs, more than any other single factor, have helped us prepare California for its future . . . To abandon them would be a grave mistake for the university and for California."

Criteria for eligibility to UC campuses include: grade point average, SAT scores, special talents, and supplemental criteria including ethnic diversity, California residency, disabilities, education disadvantage and low income.

According to UC, current eligibility rates for high school graduates are: 32.2% Asian American, 12.7% Caucasian, 5.1% African American, and 3.9% Latino.

At campuses such as UCLA and UC Berkeley, Asians and Caucasians are the largest represented

President Fujimori inaugurates 8th PANA event

Luis Sakoda of Peru succeeds Carlos Kasuga as president of organization

LIMA, Peru-Opening a new chapter to Pan American Nikkei Association's 16-year history, Peru president Alberto Fujimori was the first chief executive of state to address PANA and another Peruvian Nisei, Luis T. Sakoda, was elected PANA International president to succeed Carlos Kasuga of Mexico, the president since PANA was founded in 1981.

Inaugurating VIII COPANI (the 8th Convention of the Pan American Nikkei) on Wednesday, July 5, at the auditorium of the Peruvian Japanese Cultural Center, Fujimori called all 500 participants to work together for the progress and development of the countries of America. He said, "That getting to that position is an example to all the Nikkei.

"We can work together to achieve progress and growth of our countries. Let us put together the tradition and culture that we have received from our parents, as well as the love that we feel for our countries.

"This is precisely the reason this convention was organized," President Fujimori said, "so that Latin American Nikkei communities can become acquainted with each other, exchange experiences and be able to take solutions to their countries. Some of them relate to, for example, the integration that concerns us all as citizens of this side of the world.

"Here in Peru, one concern is national reconstruction, which is not an export issue, but that is exciting international attention."

An important contribution, Fujimori gratefully noted in particular was the assistance of \$350-million from Japan to Peru during its most difficult times for improvement of water and sewage treatment systems for Lima, modernization of its port of Callao and irrigation projects. Seated on stage among the PANA officers and representatives were Morihisa Aoki, Japanese

ambassador to Peru, and Hiroshi Nagasaki, the former ambassador and currently director-general of the Overseas Japanese Association, Tokyo. Congress member and

Minister of Energy & Mining Dr. Samuel Matsuda, a key member of President Fujimori's cabinet, emceed the opening ceremonies.

Fujimori had been originally scheduled to speak at the Sayonara buffet at the Presiden-

tial Palace Saturday but the second inaugural of Argentine President Carlos Saul Menem in Buenos Aires that day became the business of state.

Sakoda, 58, will conclude his commitment as president of the Peruvian Japanese Association this year before actively assuming his chief executive role in PANA International.

PANA delegates Yoshi Hosaka of Australia and Yasuo Harada of Venezuela were the newest nations to be represented. Other country delegates were Kazunori Kosaka, Argentina; Noritake Yano, Brazil; Art Miki, Canada; Kiyoshi Kita, Chile; Noritoshi Kanai, USA; Manuel Y. Murakami, Mexico; Richard Moriya, Paraguay; Jose Yoshida, Peru; Kenichi Tanaka, Uruguay. Delegates from Bolivia and Colombia were absent.

Following tradition, El Testimonio displaying the tiny flags flown into space by the Col. Ellison Onizuka, and photos of the astronaut and the launch, was transferred during the closing ceremonies Saturday from Peru to Mexico, site of the IX COPANI in 1997, when it celebrates its 100th anniversary of Japanese immigration.

Jaime Yoshiyama, president of the Peru's Constituent Democratic Congress, in his message to PANA delegates, said: "In spite of the problems and chaos the past, Peru is now a stable country with clear rules. All this is due to efforts of President Fujimori's government," he declared, "where the decision to totally eliminate the blot of terrorism has been an important one for the future of our country."


Kumeo Art Yoshinari

From the frying pan

How about a JACL call for Ito?

ou may not know the name of the chief justice of the United States (it's William Rehnquist, isn't it?) or recognize his face. But there's hardly anyone in the nation who hasn't heard of a California Superior Court judge named Lance Ito nor missed seeing his blackbearded features on television.

Thanks to his central role in the trial of O.J. Simpson, one-time football star and long-time TV spokesman for Hertz rental cars, Ito undoubtedly is the most recognizable member in the U.S. judicial system today. You have to be isolated on the moon not to know that Ito is the man in the black robe who is trying to maintain some semblance of justice and order as the state seeks to prove that Simpson killed his exwife and her friend in an extraordinarily violent attack.

The consensus seems to be that Judge Ito is doing a remarkably even-handed job in an extremely difficult situation. He has become a national figure, being the subject of newspaper cartoons and editorials, and coming under almost daily scrutiny by TV commentators who may or may not know what they're talking about.

I can think of only two other instances in

which Japanese Americans gained such national media attention. One was Senator Dan Inouye's part in the televised Watergate inquiry. He was a prominent member of Senator Sam Ervin's panel investigating President Richard Nixon's role in the Watergate break-in scandal.

In one televised session John J. Wilson, an attorney for some members of Nixon's White House staff, was heard to refer in some irritation to Senator Inouye as "that little Jap."

Boy, did it ever hit the fan. Wilson retreated in confusion, pleading lamely that he wouldn't mind being called "that little American." Inouye gained stature by handling the insult with great dignity.

The second incident involved Dr. S.I. Hayakawa at San Francisco State University. This was a time of campus revolt with dissidents frequently disrupting the education process. Hayakawa, as president of the university, took a dim view one day of a particularly obnoxious demonstration. Exasperated, he jumped aboard a sound truck and jerked the wires out of the loudspeakers. Television cameras caught the action and Hayakawa, jaunty in a tam-o'-shanter, appeared on every news show.

The more mature segment of America thought it was great and Hayakawa became something of a hero for the geriatric set. He also won the lasting hatred of some younger people, including Japanese Americans. That episode led Hayakawa eventually to the U.S. Senate where, unfortunately, his performance was less than spectacular.

These episodes in the lives of Senators Inouye and Hayakawa were brief. Judge Ito has been on TV almost every day for weeks, and it is likely the exposure will continue for additional months. What the publicity will do to, or for, Ito's career is anyone's guess at this time.

With tongue tightly in cheek, I would like to suggest that if Judge Ito ever tires of life on the bench, he ought to apply for the job of executive director of JACL. The JACL directorship is a position to try anyone's soul. Ito would bring to it patience, wisdom, integrity and a lot of other noble attributes.

Irregardless, recklessly

It IS SAID that the English language is one of the most difficult languages to learn. (Double negatives was another linguistic trap to watch for.)

IN TODAY'S speech pattern, there's a phrase oft repeated with the speaker interspersing with "You understand what I'm sayin'?" This idiom is a first cousin to one that preceded it: "You know what I mean." Liberally sprinkled in the speaker's dis-



He has complaints against PSW chapter members

I am a member of the Venice-Culver Chapter of JACL and I have two major complaints about the way in which business is conducted in the Pacific Southwest District.

The most flagrant prejudice and discrimination took place before and during the April 5, 1995, special Venice-Culver Chapter, JACL, meeting.

I invited a neighboring JACL chapter president to this specially called meeting to discuss the press conference called by the dissidents who opposed the downsizing of the staff. About 10 days before the meeting, I told the president of the Venice-Culver Chapter about my invitation and he said that no outsiders would be permitted. I informed my invitee that he was not to be admitted and advised him to call the president the night before the meeting in the chance he would change his mind. This was to no avail.

Craig Minami of the APAN Chapter and PSW district vice governor, and Gary Mayeda of the APAN and San Fernando Chapters, came to the meeting as invitees. I mentioned their presence, stating that I had no qualms about their presence but since the president early on opted to deny my invitee admission, I thought it was highly irregular—and the president needed to make a decision to be consistent. He did and he decided to remove Craig and Gary.

Mark Greenblatt, Venice-Culver treasurer, stated that he had invited Gary and asked the president to allow him and Craig to stay. I did not protest vehemently at that time but I did tell the president that it was his decision to allow one or both to stay. The president chose to allow both to remain.

The meeting was conducted in a very prejudiced manner. After the meeting, I told the president of my feelings in no uncertain terms.

I wish to inform JACL members that prejudice and discrimination lives on in our civil rights organization.

My second grievance is against the way in which the recent PSW fund-raising event has been handled. With praise and success, Phyllis Murakawa chaired the Pacific Southwest District Council benefit fund-raiser in December of 1994.

However, she has continued to confuse the numbers and publicize a huge profit for National JACL and the PSWDC.

As the smoke settles and partial reports are learned, it was announced to us by the four dissidents of JACL, Jonathan Kaji, treasurer, Ruth Mizobe, PSW governor, Kim Nakahara, Youth Council chair, and Trisha Murakawa, vice president for planning and development, that \$31,000 had been distributed to National from this fundraiser. The latter was announced in February, 1995, during their infamous press conference.

According to Phyllis Murakawa, no moneys have been sent to National JACL or PSWDC. In her incoherent and unintelli-

The A-bomb wasn't necessary

have been a longtime seafarer who was a captain of a ship during the war. I was most interested in a recent Viewpoint of the Pacific Citizen. I am in full agreement with Mei Nakano's article, "A-bomb apology needed."

As a seaman, I was in Japan as early as 1925, 1926 and 1927. Later I was in the Orient in 1939-1941.

I was the chief officer of the American Mail Line freighter, Satartia, of 420 feet in length. We were in the Philippine Harbor of Cebu when we were ordered out to sea about Nov. 30, 1941, because military officials expected an attack from Japan.

This was five weeks before the attack on Pearl Harbor. Finally we received permission to re-enter the port and resume loading. When we left the Philippines, we were under blackout conditions and diverted 2,000 miles out of the usual course via the straits, adjacent to Australia.

We then went on to Pearl Harbor where we took on fuel oil to continue on to Los Angeles, just before the Pearl Harbor attack.

I have read a number of books on the war, including The Final Secrets of Pearl Harbor, Nisei, Wedemyer Reports and America's Concentration Camps.

Because of these books I have read plus my personal experience,

I am convinced that Ms. Nakano is absolutely right. In reviewing the contents of my books, I recall the following:

- Pearl Harbor could have been prevented if the military commanders had been alerted.
- Knowledgeable people in Japan knew that, for them, the war was over in the fall of 1944.
- By March of 1945, Japan had requested diplomatic assistance from Russia to end the war. This request went unheeded despite the fact that our intelligence officers already knew the terms.

It seems as though Japan just had to be brought to their knees because of the anger in our country, led by President Truman.


In my opinion, because of the information gained by our intelligence, I doubt that it was necessary to fight on Iwo Jima and Okinawa. The reason I say this is because our superior Navy, Air Force, plus an outstanding Army were definitely in control and they could have surrounded Japan and starved them out. Instead of ending the war in August we could have ended hostilities in November or December and could have saved thousands of the military on both sides, plus those Japanese civilians lost at Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

The admiral in command of the large Japanese flotilla bound for Pearl Harbor is reported to have said at the time of the attack, "I am afraid that we have awakened a sleeping giant." Years before he had attended prestigious universities in the U.S. and Britain and knew of our industrial capacity to swarm over the enemy such as happened in WWI.

In reading WWII history, I am convinced that the turning point against Japan came as early as the Battle of Midway only six months after Pearl Harbor.

From here, the Japanese, still attacking, were actually on the way out. It is for this reason that in the final analysis a blockade could have been used to starve out the enemy instead of using the atomic bomb to decimate the population.

The remarkable Lance Ito


ast month I had the opportunity to participate in the installation event for the Los Angeles County Asian American Employees Association (AAEA). The evening's keynote speaker was Superior Court Judge Lance Ito.

Judge Ito was expected to arrive at 6:45 p.m. However, to the pleasure of the participants, he arrived at 6:15 p.m. Naturally, he was mobbed by the guests and the cameras began to flash. Patiently, Judge Ito willingly stood with an unending line who were all eager to capture a frame of celluloid with the world's most famous Asian American.

As the evening began, mistress of ceremonies Wendy Tokuda (KNBC news anchorperson) snapped the crowd to order in seconds. Tokuda's effervescent charm had the guests seated in record time and the program was on schedule. Tokuda introduced the special guests in attendance, which was a who's-who of government. Seventeen of 34 department heads were in attendance. Among the special guests were jockey Cory Nakatani, America's leading jockey, and Lance Migita, All-American, second team; in baseball from George Washington U.

Of course, all eyes were glued to the presentation by Judge Ito. He was intro-

duced by the noted Sansei attorney Mike Yamaki. Mike, a former member of the L.A. City Police Commission, played a pivotal role in bringing calm to the turbulent L.A. riot



As Judge Ito approached the podium the audience was on its feet. It was clear that the more than 420 guests were there in anticipation to capture a special insight on America's most well known jurist.

None would be disappointed.

Judge Lance Ito's address began with a mood breaking comment. "I'm really not sure where I am . . ." he said, ". . . after 120 flashes all I can see is one bright spot . . ." The audience was beginning to witness what would be a monologue of side-split-

ting laughter. In a series of one-liners Ito presented a scenario of life that captured the simple side of life in L.A. Extemporaneous in style, the judge had the audience in a virtual uproar of laughter; one after another he rolled a litany of lifestyle jokes that had the audience gasping for air.

Judge Ito did not let the moment escape without bringing home the salient issues of our times. He did draw the audience to pindrop silence as he recited the headlines of the press and the need for citizen involvement in their destiny and active political participation. He did this in a style uniquely his own. Precise and to the point. He carefully selected each word.

During the evening a special award was time friend, Yamaki's insight of Ito the initiated by the AAEA, the George M. Ban Memorial Award. This was recognition, presented in Mr. Ban's memory, symbolizing distinguished public service by a public servant. Ban was a Manzanar internee whose commitment to public service was rooted in his camp experience.

> The presentation of the Ban Memorial was made via a sealed envelope, opened by installed AAEA President, Howard Takata. The awardee was the Honorable Lance Ito.

> As I looked over towards the judge upon the announcement of the Ban Memorial, I could tell that he was surprised. His accep-

tance remarks were personal and deeply felt. One could sense that he knew without doubt, that despite the criticism that he faced from his role in the Simpson trial, there was a body of supporters who recognized his courage. I sensed that his appreciation for the Evacuation experience added a personal note to the significance of the award.

The installation committee was pleasantly surprised to learn that Ito asked to be invited to next year's installation. The judge wanted to present the next awardee with this public service award.

People are still talking about the evening, and all the comments are filled with praise. Judge Ito, who was the draw for the event, was also the memory of an insight, a perspective of a man . . . an Asian American with courage, dignity and an inherent sense of humor.

Come-On Sense: Judge Lance Ito is a leader who exemplifies the highest order of character and commitment. As a Japanese American he is a true hero who deserves our support. He proudly carries the legacy of the Nisei.

American trade policy is schizophrenic, author says

American Trade Policy: A Tragedy in the Making, by Anne O. Kreuger. The AEI Press, Washington, D.C., 152 pages, cloth, \$29.95, paperback, \$12.95.

Anne Kreuger's American Trade Policy is an easy-to-read paper on how the U.S. is conducting its trade policy. Kreuger accuses the U.S. of a "schizophrenic" attitude which supports multilateral trade liberalization, while increasingly favoring unilateral measures to close its own market and pries open those of trading partners. The scope of the paper is international although much discussion is included of the U.S.-Japan relation-

ship. It is important for Japanese Americans to know of the workings of the American trade policy, especially with Japan, as it inevitably affects us. According to Guy de Lonquiers of the Financial Times, growing U.S. protectionism and Washington's aggressive use of bilateral trade tactics threaten to unleash a "devastating" world trade war.

Kreuger, professor of economics at Stanford University, claims that U.S. reliance on tactics which are inconsistent with World Trade Organization (WTO) rules risks undermining the world trade system by prompting other governments to take countermeasures.

"The situation is even more worrisome because most Americans, including evidently American policymakers, appear to believe that the American economy is open and that only other countries are guilty of protection."

However, the U.S. has steadily raised trade barriers, through "voluntary" export restraints and antidumping and countervailing duty actions. These measures often harm U.S. economic performance, and reflect lobbying by powerful special interests which increasingly shape trade policy, Krueger claims.

"Much of the rhetoric about Japan, the 'unfairness' of trade and other justifications for bilateralism and protectionism originates from those seeking protection for their own narrow inter-

ests. Many of the allegations do not bear close scrutiny," writes Krueger.

She strongly criticizes such bilateral "market opening" initiatives by the U.S. such as its 1986 semiconductor agreement with Japan. Such arrangements do not expand trade, she says, but instead necessitate government-industry collusion and encourage U.S. protectionism.

Kreuger calls on the U.S. to strengthen its commitment to the WTO, reduce bilateralism, amend our trade remedy laws and ensure that regional trade agreements comply with WTO rules.

Noted U.S.-Japan expert Chalmers Johnson disagrees with

Kreuger in her depiction of how the Japanese economy works, but this does not detract from her assessment of the American trade policy.

Before teaching at Stanford, Kreuger taught at Duke University and the University of Minnesota. She served as vice president for economics and research at the World Bank from 1982 through 1986. She is 1996 president of the American Economic Association and is the author or editor of more than 30 books.

The Office of Redress Administration (ORA) has requested the Japanese American community's help in finding more than 4,000 internees, relocatees, and evacuees who are potentially eligible for redress, but who have not been located by the office despite numerous attempts.

The ORA has compiled six lists identifying these individuals by name and other historical details. Several things should be noted about the lists:

 All names are taken directly from historical sources and therefore may be spelled incorrectly or may not be an individual's current name. Also, all first names have been shortened to eight letters, and all last names to 10 letters.

 The lists are taken from various historical sources. Since many persons were interned in several locations (such as those who were moved from Immigration and Naturalization Service camps to War Relocation Authority camps), individuals' names can appear in more than one category. ORA has eliminated this type of duplication as much as possible, but it can still occur. Therefore, some people may be on these lists who have already been located by ORA.

 Each name has been assigned a unique identification (ID) number to help the office differentiate amongst individuals with similar names. This number should be used whenever possible when contacting ORA.

 ORA is continuously updating these lists. Therefore, the word "resolved" will appear next to some ID Nos. More complete Resolved lists will be provided periodically.

Description of lists

War Relocation Authority (WRA) internees

A list of those unknowns who were interned by the WRA. The list was compiled from several historical sources. The ID numbers begin with either a B or a W. The information consists of: the name of the individual as it was in camp; the year of his or her birth; and the first WRA camp the person was interned in. Camp names are missing for some of the internees.

Immigration and Naturalization (INS) camp internees

A list of those unknowns who were interned by the Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). The ID numbers begin with I. The information consists of: the name of the individual as it was in camp; the year of his or her birth; and the area from which he or she was originally relocated.

Voluntary internees

A list of those unknowns who are documented voluntary evacuees from the prohibited zones on the West Coast. The ID numbers begin with V. The information consists of: the name of the individual as it was at the time of evacuation; the year of his or her birth; and the area from which he or she was evacuated.

Crystal City, Texas internees

A list of those unknowns who were born to interned parents in the family camp in Crystal City, Texas. The ID numbers begin with C. The information consists of: the name of the individual as it was in camp and the year of his or her birth.

Persons in institutions under WRA jurisdiction

A list of those unknowns who were held in hospitals or other institutions under WRA jurisdiction. The ID numbers begin with S. The information consists of: the name of the individual as it was in the institution; the year of his or her birth; and the area from which he or she was originally relocated.

Military district of Hawaii (MDH) internees

A list of those unknowns who were interned at various locations in Hawaii. The ID numbers begin with H. The information consists of: the name of the individual as it was in camp and the year of his or her birth, if available.

Pacific Citizen will publish the ORA list in two successive issues.

The first category, or WRA internees, is published here. The remaining lists will be published in the next issue.

U.S.-Japan: Referring to the 50th anniversary of the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, Ken Nakano of the Seattle Chapter expressed his personal view that the U.S. should not yield to pressures from Japan or other countries to issue a public apology. Nakano, a member of the JACL U.S.-Japan Committee, said the bombing was a wartime decision and that it is not appropriate in 1995 to apologize for it.

Finances: After discussion by PNW Treasurer Nancy Wicker, Olympia Chapter, members voted a 10 cents per mile and \$25 per person lodging reimbursement for district business.

■ Leadership Conference program: Lynn R. Nakamoto, PNW representative to the 1995 JACL/OCA Leadership Program in Washington, D.C., March 4-8, provided members with a written report of the event. It was received so positively that Yamada suggested that more than one representative be sent to future events. The district will look into the financial feasibility.

Redress: Kinoshita reported that the ORA has paid out a total of 79,572 redress payements, with an additional 168 cases ready to be paid in the next round, which will bring the total to 79,740.

An additional 144 cases have been determined as potentially eligible but require documentation. Some 339 cases lacking enough information to make eligibility determinations are still being investigated. Cases pending appeal number 332.

Kinoshita noted that funds sufficient to cover only 80,000 cases have been appropriated by Congress. She added that the chances for additional funding by the current Congress is unlikely.

Gls return 'home' to Camp Shelby

CAMP SHELBY, Miss.—The men of the 442nd, their wives or widows, about 400 all together, came "home" to Camp Shelby over the June 16-18 weekend, welcomed by nearly 2,500 folks from nearby Hattiesburg and blessed by breezes and sunny weather in the 80s. It was the 50th anniversary Homecoming of the 100th / 442nd, Co. S (MIS) and 171st Infantry Battalion. After Pearl Harbor, Nisei were "enemy aliens" and then reclassified "U.S. citizens."

"And as an after-thought, the powers on high decided to ask for volunteers (for the U.S Army) and what happened? Some of us took up the challenge and made this after-thought an opportunity," Rev. George Aki, 442nd chaplain

at Shelby, declared. "We took up a challenge. .. It was not easy an thingtodoto volunteer for the country that put us away and make mockery of 'liberty and justice for all.'

The Sunday memorial service led with a bagpiper's call to worship, followed by posting of colors, strains of Amazing Grace, a rifle salute to the fallen comrades and the distant "Taps," almost lost to the winds ended within an hour as the group either headed home or continued their journey, some going north to the Jerome and Arkansas campsites.

elected president of NAACP; Rabbi Saperstein; and Antonia Hernandez of the Hispanic American community.

Clinton spoke in general terms, reiterating his lifelong commitment to civil rights and affirmative action and its underlying implications.

In response to a question on "set asides" (business contracts), the president said that specifics were still being worked out. He added, however, that four areas were targeted in the area of affirmative action. Generally, Clinton said that he planned to defend affirmative action.

Yasuhara pointed out that in the debates on civil rights and affirmative action, that APAs are too often overlooked or ignored. "This," said Yasuhara, "cannot continue."

Clinton was informed that the JACL president was one of the principals in a lawsuit against the Washington State Democratic Party which was resolved recently. Yasuhara said that this served notice to Democrats and Republicans alike that the APAs were not going to stand for being overlooked and mistreated in the future.

Yasuhara thanked the president for the appointment of many APAs to his adminstration more than either Presidents Bush or Reagan.

The JACL president stated that the labeling APAs as model minorities is wrong. Further, he noted that APA household incomes that are comprable to Caucasian Americans is misleading as is the image of APAs as being non-voting and apathetic.

Furthermore, Yasuhara stated that a study of exit polls in the San Francisco Bay area after the Nov. 8, 1994, elections by Dr. Larry Hajime Shinagawa revealed that 18.3% of APAs voting in that election were first time voters, more than three times the rate of other groups . . . that on issues of concern to them, they do come out and vote decisively and in large

"Moreover, 73% voted against Proposition 187 including the majority of APA Republicans and Democrats," said Yasuhara. In addition, Yasuhara cited 1990 census figures that showed 73% of APAs in California resided in six counties: Alameda, Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, San Francisco and Santa Clara. Yasuhara told the president that "we were going to be a 'force' to be reckoned with in California in 1996."

Yasuhara pointed out to the president that APAs were a very diverse group. Japanese Americans, he added, have been in America for several generations.

Thus, the needs of APAs relative to affirmative action were equally diverse from entry level jobs to positions above the "glass ceiling," Yasuhara said.

All in all, the JACL national president said that he was satisfied with the input he was able to give President Clinton. Yasuhara told the president that his remarks shouldn't be construed as hostile to him or his administration. The question of whether it'll make a difference is another matter, Yasuhara said.

"I did, however, definitely get his attention."

The national president said that hate crimes against Asians have been steadily climbing and noted the potential negative impact of

"Is our memory so short that we have forgotten our own history of immigration? How can we forget that there is work to be done and miles to go before we can rest," said Yasuhara.

groups with far fewer numbers of African Americans and Latinos.

At UCLA, current undergraduate representation is: Caucasian 36%, Asian 34.8%, African American 6.2%, Mexican American 11.8% and Latino 5%.

In an interview with the L.A. Times, Regent S. Stephen Nakashima said that he is inclined to support Connerly's position.

A San Jose attorney, Nakashima said if there had been affirmative action in the 1940s when he was going to college, he may have become an accountant instead of an attorney.

"Because of the fact that there was no affirmative action, I said, 'The hell with it, I'm going to go out and better myself.' Here's an example of benefiting from the fact that there's no affirmative action. That's my personal experience," said Nakashima.

In related news California State University officials are considering a proposal which would deny admission to students who do not show college readiness in math and English beginning in 2001.

The proposed policy would require all freshman applicants pass standardized English and math tests before being admitted to CSU schools—which constitute 22-campuses and 320,000 students.

According to CSU statistics, such changes will have a dramatic impact on minority students. In 1993, 70% of all Asian, African American and Mexican American freshmen failed to pass the English placement test. By contrast 23% of all white freshmen failed to pass the test.

On the math test, 77% of African Americans and 58% of Mexican Americans failed; while 42% of whites and 34% of Asians failed.

The proposal is not expected to be voted upon until January. Cal State Trustee Ralph Pesqueira, who is advocating the policy change, said he is doing so to send a message to public schools to better prepare students for college and indicates the reluctance of CSU trustees to continue to fund remedial classes for incoming freshmen.
