TH' ANNIVERSARY FOR JAPANESE BAP

Japanese Baptist Church will celebrate their 70th anniversary in a week long rite beginning May 18 with Dr. Jitsuo Morikawa, Sec of the Div of Evangelism of the American Baptist Convention as the principal speaker. The open house will be held Wednesday the 21st starting at 7:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served. The climax will be the anniversary banquet in the Baptist gym on Friday the 23rd. Dr. A. Hintz of the Seattle First Baptist Church will speak. Tribute will be made to the issei, 80 years and older. Limited tickets for the banquet might be available by calling Kiyo Yabuki (GL 4-5898).

Japanese Baptist Church Parallels the History of Seattle Issei
Japanese Baptists dabe back to the time when there were only 125 Japanese in Seattle. Towards the close of 1891, Seattle First Baptist Church (then on the corner of 4th and James, the site of new city hall), three Japanese young men appeared, among them C. Y. Akiyama and Fukumatsu Okazaki and made known their desire to learn the English language. With the assist from Rev. G. J. Burchett of the First Baptist Church and Mr. J.W. Sherwood, a small room was rented downtown. Japanese Baptist Mission was established with classes being held three nights a week. In May 1892 with Mrs. L.V. Ward as a teacher, four of the students were baptized, the first for the Japanese in Seattle. By 1893, a house at 515 James Street was rented. Akiyama and Okazaki were ordained as minister and returned to Japan to preach. The mission continued to flourish, moving again to larger quarter on 418 Jefferson Street which contained lodging house of 27 rooms. Many Japanese immigrants were made to feel at home upon arrival here.

Rev. Okazaki returned from Japan in 1897. Japanese Baptist was formally chartered as a church in 1899 with her first home on 624 Jackson Street in the heart of Nihonmachi. The building still stands. The present church structure was opened in 1922.

Issei rastor: Rev. Okazaki served till 1933; Rev. S. Hara, 2nd pastor 1900-1904, volunteer 1905-1940; Rev. K. Hirakawa (Winslow Mission) 1923-51; Rev. John S. Fujimura 1933-37; Rev. Shozo Hashimoto 1938-43; Rev. Masahiko Wada 1945-54; Rev. Iwahei Hori since 1955. Pioneer laymen since WWII were the late Mr. Sokichi Hoshide and the late Mr. Masatoku Amano.

English speaking pastor: Rev. Paul Gates 1921-28; Rev. Emery E. Andrews 1929-55; Rev. Peter T. Koshi 1955-68; Rev. Charles Elven 1969. Fujin Home of the Baptist Home Missions disbanded not too long ago was found by Mrs. F. Okazaki and Miss Nellie Fife in 1905. Mrs. Zen Amano, also among the pioneer organizer, is still residing in Seattle. Other missionaries included Miss Esther M. McCollough, Miss Florence M. Rumsey, and Mrs. May Herd Katayama.

DILLON S. MYER SPEAKS TO IMPROMPTU GATHERING OF CHAPTER MEMBERS

A last minute call for dinner was organized May 2 at Bush Garden for Mr. and Mrs.

Dillon S. Myer, wartime chief of the WRA.

"The thing I'm happiest about is the fact that I am accepted still. It was a trying experience for all of us in the tearing up of tusiness and family life," Myer said. "It was entirely unnecessary and since it did happen, I'm glad that it turned out as well as it has.

"27 years after the fact, I'm so happy to see so many successful people, who are not bowed down for the experience and makes him throw out his chest to say how proud he is.

On the question of Chief Justice Earl Warren, he feels that Justice Warren is making apologies through his records on civil rights matter in his "Warren's Court!" According to Myer the turning point in the attitude towards Japanese was in 1943 when Representative Martin Dies, Chairman of the House Select Committee to Investigate Un-American Activities called witnesses to appear before his committee in 1943 on the activities of the evacuees. The action of the Dies Committee so incensed the sense of public justice that the public opinion mushroomed in favor of the evacuees right then and there, ironical though it may sound. DR. KITANO EXPLAINS THE SANSEI SIDE OF THE STORY DURING COMMUNITY MEETING

Dr. Harry Kitano, PhD, Associate Professor at the School of Social Welfare, UCLA and author of "Japanese Americans: Evolution of a Subculture," spoke April 16 at the Blaine Memorial Methodist Church. He also spoke to dinner group earlier at the Four Seas Restaurant.

Sansei are quite critical of nisei parents according to Dr. Kitano: For instance, nisei has a tendency to speak in generalization to the sansei. Nisei would say, "I think I'll go fishing tomorrow." The sansei is expected to dicipher this statement to mean "You won't be able to borrow the car since I'll be using it." Generalized conversation works to nisei's advantage since he can twist his answers to go in either direction without incriminating himself, much to sansei's consternation. When the parents buy a car they would invariably pick the lower priced model when they could have gone "first class." This is enough to "blow the sansei Sansei constantly feel the "structural restraint" where the constant preaching is on spending wisely, get the most for your money as if we were still living in the depression days. This again is the source of sansei displeasure.

On JACL, Dr. Kitano says the organization should reflect current thinking and should reevaluate itself periodically and to seek ethnic reidentity. By the very presence of middle-

aged adults, Kitano believes, the development of young leaders will be hindered.
