CONVENTION DATES CROWDED WITH GALAXY OF EVENTS-HERE'S SUMMARY OF JACL DOINGS

In regard to the National JACL Convention July 26-30, it is now an appropriate time to list the many activities so that Citizen Leaguers can make plans.

JULY 26, THURSDAY: - The CONVENTION
MIXER will take on a new look this
year. The orchestra will be an
authentic Polynesian group, featuring
vocal and string music from the
Hawaiian Islands. They will also
entertain before and during the inter
mission period with dances of the
Tropical Islands.

As this is to be an informal affair and a place to get acquainted, sports-wear is recommended, especially Aloha shirts for the men and muumuus for the ladies. And of course, liquid refreshments will be available

JULY 27, FRIDAY: - PICNEER TESTIMONIAL DINNER AND OPENING CEREMONIES. This is the event in which Issei Pioneers will be the honored guests. Speaker of the evening will be none other than the Hon. Dillon S. Myer of Washington, D. C.

JULY 28, SATURDAY: - NATIONAL RECOGNITION LUNCHEON, at which the many convention awards will be made; announcement of the Nisei and the JACLer of the Biennium, the Jimmie Sakamoto Award, and others. Oldtime JACLers will be honored.

JULY 29, SUNDAY: - OUTING, and this is more than just an outing. It will include a scenic cruise on Puget Sound to Sunset Lodge on the South end of Bainbridge Island, Indian dances, outdoor authentic Salmon Barbecue, games entertainment, drawing the \$5200 raffle and other prizes..in general fun for all the families.

JULY 30; MONDAY: - CONVENTION BANQUET is the windup dinner event of the Convention at the Grand Ballroom of the Olympic. Speaker has not yet been announced, but our National representatives promise you that it will be a big name.

THE SAYONARA BALL follows the Banquet, and Convention delegates and friends will dance to the strains of Max Pillar's orchestra, 10-pieces and tops for dancing around the Puget Sound country.

The foregoing events of the Convention are those which with the Souvenir booklet are included in the package deal. Individually they add up to \$33.50. In the package, the cost of \$30.00; children 12 and under go to the outing for \$4.65 (instead of \$8.00) and kids 5 and under are free. The Youth Group package is \$25.

HERE'S THE BREAKDOWN ON OTHER SPECIAL EVENTS

GOLF TOURNAMENT: Friday, July 27 at Ingle-wood Golf Course, Kenmore. The fee is \$12.00 and includes green fee, luncheon and bus transportation. Inglewood is a 40-minute drive from Seattle, is the best championship course in this area. This tournament is open to JACL members only, and each participant will be required to submit an authorized handicap from his club secretary.

FISHING DERPY: Friday, July 27 at Westport, Washington 7:00 AM-4:00 PM. Fee is \$11.00 on one of 8 modern 40' boats which accommodate 10 to 14 fishermen per boat. Equipment can be rented, or you can bring your own. Dress warmly!! BRIDGE TOURNAMENT: Saturday, July 28, 1:00 PM at the Olympic Hotel. The fee is \$2.00 per person and the Seattle Nisei Bridge Club will conduct a Duplicate Bridge Tournament with the top prize being the perpetual Bridge Trophy donated by Dr. Hiura. Four additional trophies will be awarded to the winners of the North-South and East-West. Keen competition is promised and it is expected that this will be the biggest JACL Duplicate Bridge Tourney in history. If you need a partner, contact the Seattle JACL. July 28 at the Bush Garden. This traditional JACL party you can enjoy in a leisurely Japanese atmosphere. The second floor of the Bush Garden can accommodate hundreds, and the evening is planned ona pay-as-you-go basis. The house has promised JACLers attractive rates on the liquid refreshments, and the same goes for the delicious Japanese food you get at the Garden, too.

Herewith are a few more words to describe the Sunday outing at Sunset Lodge. Transportation to Fisherman's Terminal may be either by chartered bus or private cars. Boats will leave at 4:30 PM and arrive at the Lodge about 6:00 PM where there is plenty to see, including the barbecuing and kippering of the salmon to be served.

The menu includes the following--all you can eat. Steamed Hood Canal clams and clam nectar--kippered salmon snacks with wafers--barbecued fillets of salmon with Tartar Sauce and lemon--Tossed Salad--Baked Potato with butter--hot French or garlic bread--dessert-coffee or tea.
