SEATTLE KEIRO NURSING HOME NEWS

Expansion Plans—It was in October 1976, when the doors of Keiro were first opened, and already, plans are underway with Tosh Okamoto, fund raising chairperson to launch a capital-improvements drive For \$100,000. This amount will be used for expansion and will not be applied to the initial campaign to raise \$500,000 to establish Keiro, to which \$460,000 has been subscribed to date. Okamoto stated that due to high patient participation in activities the dining room is to be expanded into a multi-purpose room. Also, bathrooms will be installed in the south wing, which presently lacks such facilities. Pledges and contributions may be sent to Seattle Keiro, c/o Capital Improvements Fund, 1700-24th Avenue South, Seattle, Wasgington 98144. All contributions are tax deductible.

KEIRO GARDENS - a showpiece -- Under the leadership of Chuck Ikeda and Mits Takahashi of the Japanese Cardeners Association, the Keiro garden area got a thorough spring cleaning by its members. Takahashi stated "We want to see it grow into a stable and successful facility and our helping with the gardening is our way of showing our support for the great project. The garden outside, beautifully taken care of is a show piece itself, and reflects the image

of what wonderful care is given inside of the facility to the elders.

Kokero-kai--what is it? It is a Day Health Center, which has opened under the auspices of the Issel concerns, at the Japanese Presbyterin Church, located a block from Keiro. The program aims to provide independence for those who live alone or with families by providing social and health services. Anyone over 60 years of age, capable of taking care of basic needs may participate. It is offered Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Participants need not attend every session. The cost is \$2.00 per day, which includes a well balanced meal at noon. For further information call Dennis Yamashita at Keiro, 323 6900.

Keiro Women's Guild - Ayame Kai, a Keiro Yomen's Guild has been formed under the guidance of Joan Seko. It first met on February 2, at which time cushions were made for patients. Membership islimited to 20; currently, there are 16 members. Anyone wishing to join or is interested in forming a guild is asked to call Joan Seko at 747 1320. Ayame Kai meets every third Wednesday of the month.

Inspection and Tours

Keiro passed its annual State of Washington 3 day inspection, according to Russ Akiyama, administrator. The inspection is to determine if Keiro is in compliance with state and Federal regulations in the operation of the nursing home.

50 of the 300 Hyogo prefecture delegates were taken on a tour of Keiro in small groups by nursing home volunteers and staff on April 2. Many of them are involved in nursing home and retirement programs in Hyogo and were enlightened by the slides of Keiro activities including the Day Health Center. Ken Nakano, with Juliane Kumasaka co-chaired the program.

#### 25TH BIENNIAL NATIONAL CONVENTION

The 1978 National JACL Convention will be held in Salt Lake City, Utah, July 17-23, 1978. Host chapters, Mt. Olympus and Salt Lake City, will chronicle the achievements of JACL in their 1978 Silver Anniversary Convention Booklet, which is to be mailed to each JACL household. Masao Tsukamoto, President of the Pocatello-Blackfoot Chapter, reports that his chapter would like to see a memorial erected at the Hunt Relocation Center, with a pilgrimage planned either before or after the Convention, and requests suggestions, information, photographs, films, documents that could be used for a display at the Convention. Tsukamoto's address is Rt. 1, Box 121, Blackfoot, Idaho.

Tsukamoto reports that at the Hunt Relocation Center site, there is a small area on which remains of the old guard house are still standing, which is federal property. Contacts have been made with Senator Church to inquire as to the possibility of having the area declared a national monument site. As an alternative, Tsukamoto says, if the request is denied, they will ask that the property be deeded to the Idaho Historical Society which has expressed willingness to establish the site as a state monument with appropriate highway markers.

MILESTONES (cont.): Memorial services were held in March for Mrs. May Herd Katayama, 84, at the Japanese Baptist Church. Affectionately known as "Mrs. K.", Mrs. Katayama served the church for 50 years, coming to work at the Japanese Baptist Church in 1928. She attended the Baptist Missionary Training School in Chicago and was the last of the missionaries sent to Seattle church by the American Baptist Churches.
