#### ELECTION RESULTS

The 1987 JACL elections are over and 227 of the 800 plus ballots mailed out were returned. With the exception of the Officers and Group I, since both groups ran unopposed, the races for Group II and Group III were closely contested. For instance, the results showed that, in the Group II race, only 12 votes separated the top three finishers, and only eight votes separated the three nominees for the the seventh and final slot. In Group III, the last five Board positions were separated by 15 votes.

Naomi Iwata-Sanchez of the Anti-Discrimination Committee reported that 24 people attended the November 5 dinner and meeting of Seattle-area human rights organizations. She felt that the event was an excellent networking opportunity for the organizations. This coalition plans to meet every two months, and the next meeting is planned for February.

Wayne Kimura of the Redress Committee commented that the Bainbridge Island photo exhibit on November 8 and 9 was very well done and attracted a good turnout. Wayne also mentioned that 1987 is probably going to be the most important year for redress. This is because the top three people in Congress are in favor of redress.

Ken Nakano of the International Relations Committee gave a report on the farewell tribute for Japanese Consul Toshio Isogai. At an October dinner in his honor, prominent local officials attended, including U.S. Congressman Mike Lowry, City Council member Dolores Sibonga, City Director of Human Resources Dave Okimoto, Seattle Chapter JACL President Bob Sato and JACL National Vice President Cherry Kinoshita. Isogai, who has been reassigned to an as-yet undisclosed location, stressed the importance of free trade between Japan and Washington State and cautioned against protectionist legislation.









