CONGRESSMAN BONKER DECIDES TO SUPPORT REDRESS

Pacific Northwest District (PNW) Redress Coordinator Cherry Kinoshita, PNW Area Coordinator Chuck Kato, and Seattle JACL Redress Co-chair Tim Gojio met with Congressman Don Bonker (3rd District, Wash.) on August 12 at the Elliott Bay Bookstore and later received the following letter:

August 12, 1987

To Cherry --

This is to inform you that I intend to vote in favor of HR 442 when it reaches the House floor later this year. As you know I have reservations over how the money is to be appropriated pursuant to Graham-Rudman budget schedules, but I feel the issue should move forward at this time.

Except for Congressman Rod Chandler (R-8th District), the rest of the Washington State Congressional delegation, consisting of two senators and seven representatives, is either cosponsoring the redress bills or committed in writing to vote "yes." HR 442 is tentatively scheduled for a vote on the House floor on September 17.

SECOND ASIAN AMERICAN FILM FESTIVAL

The Second Asian American Film Festival, sponsored by the International Examiner, Kingstreet Media, Chevron USA, Inc., and Seattle Chapter JACL, will be held on Friday, October 2 through Sunday, October 4 at Kane Hall on the University of Washington campus.

The first Asian American Film Festival, held in 1985 and sponsored by Kingstreet Media, featured only Asian American dramatic films. This year's festival will include over 30 dramatic, documentary, experimental and animated films by and about Asian Americans, and films from Asia, including the People's Republic of China and Thailand.

There will be two programs each evening--the first at 7 p.m. and the second at 9:15 p.m. On Sunday, there will also be a matinee showing of animated and experimental films at 2 p.m. Two feature-length films from the People's Republic of China will be shown Saturday night, October 3--the first at 7 p.m., and the second at 9:00 p.m. A complete schedule with a description of each film will appear in the September 16 issue of the International Examiner.

Shimoda: Asian American Actor" and "Conversations: Before the War/After the War."

"Yuki Shimoda: Asian American Actor" by Los Angeles filmmaker John Esaki, re-creates the 30-year career of the late Nisei actor and dancer Yuki Shimoda, who was best known for this acclaimed performance as the father in "Farewell to Manzanar." Not only an intriguing profile of Shimoda through film clips and interviews, this film is also a frank and honest assessment of the Asian American actor's opportunities in the Hollywood entertainment industry.

"Conversations: Before the War/After the War," by Los Angeles filmmaker and UCLA professor Robert Nakamura, is a dramatic retelling of the internment experience and its aftermath told through the recollections of three Nisei. One of the actors, community activist Warren Furutani, was recently elected as the first Asian American to serve on the Los Angeles School Board.

and transporting to medical services, essential shopping and errands, splitting/stacking/carrying wood, laundry and housework, cooking, special diet preparation, feeding assistance with dressing and undressing, bed transfer, ambulation, wheelchair transfer, bathing, toileting and reminders to take medicines.

Another arrangement can be made through the Independent Living Program, where services are performed by community workers for a fee. Services include housekeeping assistance, personal care assistance, live-in care, overnight care, and consultation from a geriatric specialist to help older adults and their families deal with issues such as transition, loss, socialization, health needs, financial issues and housing alternatives.


