MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

April 20, 1988 is, along with September 17, 1987, another "red letter day" for the Asian community. The dates are, respectively, passage of Senate Bill 1009 and House Resolution 442. Both congressional bills call for an official apology from the U.S. government for the internment, payment of \$20,000 to each surviving internee, and the establishment of an educational trust fund to insure that the internment will never happen again.

I sense a feeling of vindication from Nikkei with whom I have discussed the topic, and, of course, President Reagan must yet sign the legislation into law. Only with monetary compensation can the legislation have any real meaning and

impact for us and to believe our injustices have truly been redressed.

Please write a personal letter to the President urging that he sign the bill. At the same time, please write to the archives to obtain your documentation regarding internment. The address is:

CONVENTION UPDATE

On-Campus Housing: We have approximately 200 rooms on campus that will serve as the primary housing site for the 1988 convention. There is a minimum four day package that will basically entail a "Bed and Breakfast" format. Additional days will be available for those who wish to arrive early for the pre-convention activities. The cost of the four day package is \$89.00 per person double occupancy, or \$109.00 single per person.

Breakfast will be included each day for those choosing this option. We have committed to the University that we will guarantee a minimum of 300 of these packages will be purchased. With the shortened schedule, those who opt for hotel accommodations may be enormously inconvenienced. No convention activities are being planned for the hotel site. All National Council business meetings will be held in the McMahon Hall dining room on campus. The rate for extra days (over four) on campus will be \$25.00 per person double occupancy and \$27.25 single per person.

Off-Campus Housing: 100 rooms have been reserved at Nendel's University Plaza Hotels, which is two miles from campus. It will be available on an "as space is available" basis. We are not planning to offer a shuttle system from this building to campus, which is not really within walking distance. The daily rates for a hotel room are \$58.00 for a double room, and \$52.00 for a single.

Banquets: The Opening Banquet will be held on Sunday, August 7. At this time, Senator Spark Matsunaga appears to be the keynote speaker. Also, the following awards will be presented: speech contest awards; Japanese American of the Biennium, Edison Uno Civil Rights Award and the Inagaki chapter award.

The Awards Luncheon will be held on Monday, August 8. The Masaoka

Distinguished Service Award is tentatively scheduled to be presented at this event.

The final Sayonara Banquet will take place on Tuesday, August 9. The JACLer of the Biennium award will be presented and incoming officers will be sworn in. We are expecting to secure a speaker that will be of great interest to the delegates and a draw for local members.

Workshops: The following eight committees have been approved by the National Board to hold convention workshops: Aging & Retirement, Anti-Asian Violence, Ethnic Concerns, Leadership Development, Membership Development, Redress, U.S./Japan Relations and Women's Concerns.

The first set of workshops will be held from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday, August 7. Aging & Retirement, U.S./Japan Relations and Women's Concerns have been scheduled for this time period. All other workshops will be held from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, August 9. This time period includes Anti-Asian Violence, Ethnic Concerns, Leadership, Membership and Redress.

Golf Tournament: This will be a 35-hole contest to be held on two municipal golf courses in Seattle. Miller Beer is sponsoring this event with a \$11,000 donation.

Tennis Competition: Non-competitive, recreational tennis play is tentatively set for Thursday and Friday, August 4 and 5.

We have secured some nationally-known speakers and workshop facilitators for this event. It will be limited to 150 persons and will also serve as a recruitment drive and to establish better JACL-Corporate relationships.

Educational Conference: The purpose of this gathering is to bring together Nikkei educators to review the possible position JACL may take if the redress bill should become law and the educational trust fund is established.

Salmon & Clam Bake: To close the entire 1988 convention, a salmon and clam bake will be held at Discovery Park. The food will be prepared by United Indians of All Tribes at the Daybreak Star Center in the park. Coors Beer is interested

in sponsoring this event with a donation.

Tours, etc.: A host of "booster" activities is currently being planned. Included are tours to the International District, Space Needle, Pike Place Market, Waterfront, Harbor Tours, Mount Rainier or St. Helens, or Vancouver, Canada. The options will surely provide something of interest to even the most discerning JACLer.

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












DAY OF REMEMBRANCE ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

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
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
