

Congressman Norm Mineta and Congressman Robert Matsui, who will share the keynote address, assured passage of HR 442 in the House on September 17, 1987 through their extraordinary efforts among their colleagues. Hawaii Senator Spark Matsunaga, who was originally scheduled to be the keynote speaker, will be unable to attend due to pressing commitments which have unexpectedly arisen in his home state of Hawaii. Senator Matsunaga led the drive for the overwhelming passage of S. 1009 on April 20, 1988.

Hawaii Senator Daniel Inouye will be honored for his key role as prime sponsor of the bill establishing the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians. The recommendations of the Commission formed the basis for the redress legislative bills which were introduced in 1983.

Washington Congressman Mike Lowry will be honored for his political courage in being the first to introduce a redress bill, as a freshman congressman in 1979, which provided for individual monetary compensation.

Cited for outstanding contributions to redress in the legislative strategies area will be Mike Masaoka, whose lobbying skills span four decades of experience. Grant Ujifusa, JACL-LEC strategies chair, will be recognized for his indispensable work within administration circles, which was the key to the President's turnaround in favoring the bill. Minoru Yasui will be honored with a posthumous award for his long standing dedication to the redress cause.
