(Chapter Focus)

BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The Seattle Chapter JACL has raised \$6,000 in cash and pledges toward the Legislative Education Committee (LEC) goal of \$10,000. President Dave Okimoto again encouraged total Board support of LEC through donations and fundraising.

Wayne Kimura summarized a Redress Committee meeting with Congressman Mike Lowry on September 7, 1985. The committee and Congressman Lowry met at length to discuss the progress of redress bills currently being acted on in the U. S. Congress. Later, the committee also met with Tim Gojio, JACL Washington D. C. Representative. Both Congressman Lowry and Tim Gojio expressed optimism about the bills being passed through House and Senate subcommittees. Representative Dan Glickman of Kansas, chairman of the House Subcommittee on Administrative Law and Governmental Relations, is receptive to redress. However, Senator William Roth of Delaware, chairman of the Senate Committee on Governmental Affairs, is not favorable toward redress legislation.

Congressman Lowry and Tim Gojio emphasized the urgency to locate constituents in Kansas and Delaware who can write to Congressman Glickman and Senator Roth to urge them to support the redress bills. If anyone knows of people who live in those states, whether they be relatives or friends, please call Cherry Kinoshita at 721-0717, or Wayne Kimura at 725-7298.

The Anti-Discrimination Committee, chaired by Theresa Fujiwara, reported on the progress of activities on the movie, "Year of the Dragon." National JACL issued a statement condemning the portrayal of Asian Americans in the film. After nationwide protests by numerous Asian American organizations, MGM/UA, distributors of "Year of the Dragon," issued a disclaimer to be attached to the film, stating that the movie is not meant to be reflective of the entire Asian American community.

Bob Sato reported on the Education Committee's activities regarding statements

made by Seattle School Board member Ellen Roe. They are in contact with the black community, and JACL will support them if they were to pursue recall.

To encourage a settlement of the Seattle School District teacher's strike, The Board approved the writing of a letter asking for a negotiated end to the strike.

Ken Nakano of the International Relations Committee reported on a proposed second meeting with the Seattle Japanese Consulate General. Ken is also working with U. S. Congressman Mike Lowry to make "Jpn." the official abbreviation of Japanese/Japan.

Newsletter Committee Chair Sharon Harada thanked Sumi Hayashi for her contributions as past editor of the newsletter. Ken Mochizuki was introduced as the new editor.

The Recognitions Committee will be meeting soon to nominate individuals to be recognized at the Installation Banquet in January. Contact Bob Sato at 325-9243 if you would like to nominate someone, and include your reasons for the nomination.

Attorney Roger Shimizu reported that although Gordon Hirabayashi's trial concluded on June 27, the legal team is still working on final arguments due October 4.


