Thus, I have been reading — *They Call Me Moses Masaoka*, by Mike Masaoka with Bill Hosokawa; JACL in Quest of Justice, History of the Japanese American Citizens League, by Bill Hosokawa; Personal Justice Denied, the Report of the Commission on Wartime Relocation and Internment of Civilians; and *The Bamboo People: The Law and Japanese Americans*, by Frank F. Chuman. These books are helping me to raise my awareness of this important event in American history. I would recommend these books, (and I am sure there are others), for any members who are interested in the history of JACL and of Japanese Americans in the United States. JACL activities were crucial to the passage of redress; let's steer JACL so as to continue contributing and working to make this world a better place.

Hate Crimes: definitions, response, and prevention

In Washington State, a hate crime is called "malicious harassment," which is defined as "the intent to intimidate or harass another person because of that person's race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, or mental, physical, or sensory handicap." The City of Seattle law broadens that definition to include intimidation and harassment based on sexual orientation, gender, marital status, political ideology, age, and parental status.

In 1991, the Seattle Police Department received over 175 reports of hate crimes committed against persons because of their race, religion, ethnic origin, or political beliefs. If you are a victim of a hate crime or witness a hate crime, call the police and/or a victim advocacy agency such as the Northwest Coalition Against Malicious Harassment (NWCAMH) at 233-9136 or the Washington State Office of Crime Victims Advocacy at 1-800-822-1067.

If you have questions about your rights or wish to know more about hate crimes, a number of agencies also provide educational and referral services: the King County Office of Civil Rights at 296-7592, and the City of Seattle Hate Crimes Information and Referral Line at 233-1080. For a brochure listing these and other numbers and information, call Elaine Ko at 684-0390.

The NWACMH is holding its 1992 Annual Conferencein Eugene, Oregon on October 23-25. NWACMH works to determine the dimensions of the problem and threat of harassment; to monitor activities of groups that advocate racial supremacy; to assist local communities to develop strategies to combat hate crimes; to provide education on the broad topics of prejudice and bias; to encourage the reporting of hate crimes; and to facilitate the response of law enforcement agencies to hate crimes. Registration for the conference is \$45 per person (\$30 for students), which covers two days of workshops (8-12 concurrentworkshopsinsixsession), four keynotespeeches, entertainment, and Continental breakfasts. Singleday attendance is \$30 per person. For registration, call (503) 687-4488 by October 16.


Chapter Focus






Seattle Japan Language School 90th Anniversary
