# President's Message

Konnichi wa! At the Pacific Northwest District meeting in Portland, your District Council voted to pass a resolution on the state of Oregon's Measure No. 9. This proposal would have amended the state constitution requiring all governments discourage homosexuality, other listed "behaviors." Our resolution:

WHEREAS the passage of Ballot Measure 9 in the November 1992 general election would amend the Oregon constitution to remove civil rights for gay and lesbian residents of Oregon;

WHEREAS no other state in the United States has singled out a group of citizens and declared the group to be undeserving of civil rights protections in its state Constitution in recent history;

WHEREAS Japanese Americans are well aware of the dangers of government discrimination in violation of a people's civil rights under the Constitution, through the shameful legacy of forced internment in the United States during World War II;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Pacific Northwest District Council of the Japanese American Citizens League strongly opposes passage of the Oregon Ballot Measure No. 9 in the November, 1992 general election, and takes active steps to make its position known to all its chapter members and the general public.

It is important that groups such as the JACL continue to take a leadership role on civil rights issues, which includes voicing concerns and opinions on current events in our local communities, Washington State, the United States and the international community. The JACL is an effective organization, and we truly can help make changes happen.

PostScript (11/9/92) There's a sense of a new beginning, with U.S. President-elect Bill Clinton and Washington Governor-elect Mike Lowry. Clinton met with representatives of the Asian American community during his recent trip to Seattle and he also made a personal phone call to JACL at the National Convention. Lowry is a longtime supporter of JACL and redress. The Oregon Measure #9 did not pass, but about 45% did vote for it, and we must address that fact. There's much work to be done in JACL. Let us be inspired by our new leaders. Join your Seattle chapter JACL and participate in our activities. Your input makes a difference.

# Legacy Fund benefits Seattle Chapter

Since the kick-off of the JACL Legacy fund in the fall of 1990 to the end of September 1992, contributions credited to the Seattle Chapter total \$256,065. Nationally, the Fund balance as of mid-September is \$3,506,239 or 35% of its final goal of \$410 million.

Proceeds from the first year's revenue allocated to a grants program have been awarded to nine chapters, including Seattle, in amounts ranging from \$500 to \$1500 for programs that will promote the goals of JACL. Projects range from an anti-Asian violence seminar, a tiny tots cultural awareness program, educational videos, to a teacher's training program. Details of the Seattle Chapter program, which will be a series of seminars open to the public, will be issued soon.

Under the revenue-sharing feature of the Legacy

Fund, the Seattle Chapter also received \$1080.65 from the first year's income, an amount which should continue each year if contributions keep up to the proportionate level of the first two years. The benefits of contributing to the Legacy Fund can thus be realized at both the local and national levels. Donations may be made payable to JACL Legacy Fund and mailed to the JACL/PNW, 671 S. 
