Dinner with Consulate office

The International Relations Committee, chaired by Ken Nakano, hosted a dinner with members of the Japanese Consulate. The Honorable Masaki Saito, Consul General, gave an overview of the Consulate's three main roles: to provide visas and travel information for travellers to Japan; to monitor the economic and political situation in Montana, northern Idaho, and Washington; and to coordinate and assist cultural programs, including student and teacher exchanges. Consul Takahashi discussed the economy of Japan and the U.S. trade deficit; Consul Nagamatsu discussed the JET (Japanese Exchange and Teaching) program. Saki Shimizu, a JET teacher in 1989, presented a slide show of her visit to Japan, and Ken Nakano wound up the program with a history of JACL's international relations activities.

Center for Career Alternatives

The Center for Career Alternatives' (CCA) 13th Annual Dinner celebration will be held on Friday, February 5, 1993 at the Sheraton Seattle Hotel and Towers. The CCA is a community-based nonprofit organization that provides educational services, vocational training, job search skills and employment placement. This year, the CCA helped over 750 economically disadvantaged participants learn the skills they need to succeed in school, the workplace, and in life. In October, the Washington Department of Community Development

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awarded a federally-funded \$58,000 contract to the CCA for a youth violence prevention and intervention program. Fifty youths between the ages of 14 and 18 years will receive pre-employment training and job referrals, one-on-one counselling, home visits, and parent education will focus on self-esteem, a sense of community and family responsibility, anger control, and how to say "no" in the face of street pressure.

Travelers Aid Society

One Song, Many Voices

A multi-ethnic team at the Wing Luke Asian Museum has begun research to create a permanent centerpiece exhibit, "One Song, Many Voices," on the history and culture of Asian Pacific Americans in Washington. The exhibit, the only one of its kind in

the nation, will consist of 85 photos and over 200 artifacts. It will focus on ten groups: Chinese, Japanese, Filipinos, Koreans, Vietnamese, Cambodians, Laotians, Southeast Asian Hill Tribes, South Asians, and Pacific Islanders. The exhibit will open on April 30, 1993, to kick off Asian Pacific Heritage Month in May. The Museum plans to create a portable version of the exhibit as well as new Asian American curriculum kits for classroom use. The Museum is seeking to raise \$182,000 for the exhibit and related programs. Oral History Project

The Seattle City Department of Neighborhoods has awarded a grant to support the Wing Luke Asian Museum's oral history project on the International District. Interviews will be conducted with thirty longtime ID residents and businesspeople, and photos and artifacts collected as part of the Museum's permanent exhibit on the neighborhood. "This project will preserve the stories of the community elders and their legacy for future generations," says Ron Chew, Museum Director. "It will also empower community volunteers, especially younger people, to develop pride in their heritage and the accomplishment of the pioneers."
