On January 23, representatives from nine Nikkei organizations met to discuss common concerns in an effort to identify ways to more effectively work with each other. The participating organizations at the initial meeting were: Nisei Veterans, Nikkei Concerns, Lake Washington JACL, Japanese Language School, Japanese Cultural Center, Japanese Community Service, Japanese American Chamber of Commerce, Seattle Chapter JACL, and the Japan America Society.

For starters, space, fund raising and on-going collaboration were identified as issues to address. I

Chapter Focus

Seattle JACL Legacy Fund Donations Lead National Chapters

As of December 31, 1992, a total of \$267,865 has been raised by the Seattle JACL Legacy Fund Committee, which is still leading all other JACL chapters in raising Legacy funds. An additional \$4,750 raised so far this year, makes the grand total to date of \$272,615, according to past Legacy Fund Chair Cherry Kinoshita.

Approximately 60% of the 1990-'92 total of \$453,580.15 for the Pacific Northwest District has been contributed by Seattle Chapter. The two-year total raised by the nine chapters of the PNW has reached 64.8% of the \$700,000 goal for the District.

New Director of Fund Development at national headquarters Gail Ideno will be outlining goals and a fresh marketing strategy which is expected to be promoted in the near future. Ideno comes to JACL from the Harriman Communications Center and from Foote, Cone and Belding Direct West, a direct marketing agency in San Francisco.

The Kame Project Needs Your Help

The Kame Project, University of Washington's health and aging study of Seattle-area Japanese, has located approximately 3,450 older Nikkei and included them in their scientific portrait of the community. This figure represents an estimated 70% of the total number estimated to be residing in King County.

The Kame project is trying to identify those in the 30% not counted (close to 1,550), particularly those who are 80 years or older.

If you were a Nikkei resident of King County and were 55 years old or older as of November 1, 1991, you are important to the Kame Project's effort to achieve an accurate assessment of how the Japanese community is aging! Without you, study findings may

be inconclusive. You count!




