The results of last month's elections and the post-election rhetoric is disturbing, to say the least. The passage of Proposition 187 in California with its racist overtones is frightening, and worse, there is support to introduce similar legislation around the country. I think most people agree that illegal immigration is a problem that we need to address. However, excluding and isolating people is not the answer, especially when it is children who will be the ultimate losers. With Proposition 187, children will suffer most by not receiving proper health care, education and other vital services.

As with most of the recent reform efforts, economics is a main reason for this immigration reform effort. However, in this case, denying services to children and families may well end up costing taxpayers more. The children will still receive health care, but instead of receiving preventative care in clinics they will receive emergency care in hospitals. Instead of receiving an education and becoming productive members of society, they will end up marginalized and always need public assistance. Instead of receiving cost effective services today, these children will need expensive, intensive services later in their life. Through the years, we have taken great pride in saying that our children, at least economically, "will have it better than we did." It makes one wonder if our society is becoming so selfish that we are more concerned with our own comfort than with the future of our children.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as President during the past 12 months. During the year, I have gained a deeper appreciation of the history and importance of the JACL, and especially the Seattle Chapter. Serving as President has only strengthened my commitment to the mission of JACL. A special thank you to the committed Board members and volunteers who participated in the many activities this year. The success of JACL and the Seattle Chapter results from your hard work and dedication.

The Museum needs historical photos and artifacts from the hotel and the surrounding area.




