# **President's Report**


One of the tasks that go along with the job of chapter president is that of writing a monthly piece for the Newsletter. Since there are no guidelines for doing so, the presumption is that I am free to write about anything that happens to be on my mind at the moment. In some respects, that openendedness is liberating, but it also forces me to realize that the contents of my mind are not likely to be of interest to many people.

I would hazard a guess that most persons who pick up the Newsletter are, however, interested in what is going on in the chapter. And so, I have decided that I will use part of this space to report on at least those chapter activities with which I have been involved. What goes into the rest of the space may very ell end up being some of my random thoughts, but let's see what happens.

January has turned out to be a busy month for a good many board members, and I am grateful to them for the extra hours they have so willingly put in. In addition to a regularly scheduled Saturday retreat for the new board and preparations for the annual installation banquet, a special meeting was held to discuss the financial crisis in the national office. Our board voted, without dissent, to endorse the considered actions of the National Board in its attempts to deal with the problem. It also voted to give our public support to President Denny Yasuhara who was and is still being personally assailed by a number of vocal critics for those actions.

Later in the month, following the tragic and disastrous earthquake in Kobe, the board undertook a mailing to our membership asking for funds for earthquake victims. Our fundraising on the local level is tied in with the national JACL's effort. We are assured that 100 percent of funds received will go toward victim relief.

The banquet itself will be remembered for the earthquake that trembled us into attention. Coming as it did immediately after leverend Sawano had asked us for a moment of silence in remembrance of the victims of the Kobe disaster, it was a chilling reminder of what could happen here. Fortunately, everyone remained calm, and because there was no damage reported, the dinner continued.

But the banquet will also be remembered for the rousing keynote address given by George Takei, of "Star Trek" fame. He spoke briefly of his early years, the importance of some of JACL's accomplishments to him and his family, and the need for us to continue our vigilance against the actions of those who are quick to deny the civil rights of others. These people are akin to the folks, he noted, who so strongly advocated the removal of Japanese Americans from the West Coast in 1942. He received a standing ovation from the crowd — an appropriate response to this thoughtful man.

Finally, I'd like to report that the Seattle chapter of the American Jewish Committee has taken the initiative in calling for a conference of representatives of Asian American and Jewish American communities to identify areas of common interest, strengthen relations among the groups, and establish a framework for future cooperation. We have agreed to cooperate with

# Community Focus • • **Redress Report**

#### Redress for 79,515 completed

Preparations will begin in the latter part of February for the next cycle of redress payments to approximately 40 claimants who have been declared eligible, according to the Office of Redress Administration.

As of the first of this year, the Office of Redress Adminiseligible recipients, with \$9.7 million in appropriations remaining to fund an additional 485 payments.

While 79,515 cases were processed, the total number of redress checks disbursed is 82,598 due to payments made to heirs. The six states with the largest number of recipients are: California-59,536; Washington-5,590; Illinois-1,239.

A total of 2,316 individuals have been found ineligible since the start of the program and a number of these are ates Seattle Keiro, Kokoro Kai and Nikkei Horizons. undergoing appeals or have been referred to the appellate division. #### Civil Liberties Public Education Fund threatened

The \$5 million appropriated by last year's Congress for the Civil Liberties Public Education Fund may be threatened by the rescission package being considered by the Republican leadership. Although the seven White House nominees for the Education Fund Board of Directors who were announced last year were renominated on January 5 and resubmitted to the new Senate Committee on Governmental Affairs, confirmation by the Senate has not yet been completed. The Governmental Affairs Committee is chaired by Senator William Roth (R-Del). The ranking minority member is Senator John Glenn (D-Ohio).

The two other nominees for the 9-member Public Education Fund Board have not yet completed the voting process, according to the White House personnel office.

## Anne Arakaki-Lock appointed acting director of Nikkei Concerns

Nikkei Concerns board president announced January 19 that Executive Director/Administrator Russell Akiyama has submitted his resignation to become Administrator of Group Health Cooperative's Care Center at Kelsey Creek.



# Relief Fund established; help from JACL members sought

The numbers are staggering. Over 5,000 dead, more than 23,000 injured; nearly 300,000 living in emergency shelters. The grim television coverage of the disastrous earthquake in Japan and the scenes of human distress leave us asking "What can I do to help?" The JACL has worked out a cooperative arrangement with the Japanese Cultural & Community Center of Northern California which has established the Kobe/Osaka Earthquake Relief Fund. The Fund will send the contributions to charitable organizations in Japan which have given their assurances that 100 percent of the funds received will go towards food, water, clothing, blankets, temporary shelter, medical supplies, etc. There will be no deductions for administrative expenses.

The State House of Representatives January 20, adopted unanimously a House Resolution calling on the State House to assist the people of Kobe and its outlying areas "by facilitating the ongoing relief effort in any way possible."

Resolution 95-4606, introduced by Rep. Kip Tokuda, was the first bill passed by this year's legislature.
