Guest columnist A successful symposium

(President-elect Elaine Akagi is substituting for President Cal Takagi, who is recuperating from cardiovascular illness.)

In 1994, the Seattle Chapter applied for a grant from the National JACL Legacy Fund with the purpose of helping young Asian Pacific Island adults learn more about careers and networking with the community. The chapter was awarded the grant and began planning the symposium.

On Saturday, November 4, the planners successfully reized their goal. Almost 50 young high school, university and graduate school students attended the symposium, "Your Career and the Community." Bob Santos, unofficial mayor of the International District, "Uncle Bob" to many, gave the lighthearted keynote address. He related how the Asian community united to be the voice of the ID. That voice was heard by the Mayor of Seattle, the Governor of the State, and even by the federal government.

Among the highlights of the evening will be the presentations of awards, based on the theme for this year's dinner, "For the Sake of the Community." Several people who have given unselfishly to the community will be honored: Kay Abe, who has been feeding the homeless for many

years; Russell Akiyama, former Administrator of Keiro Nursing Home; Judge Thomas Haven, who personally put together an exhibit on relocation in Kittitas Co.; and Fumiko Maeshiro, former principal of the Japanese Language School.

The Don Kazama award will be presented to Bob Shimabukuro, who has been active in our community for many years. Currently the executive director of the Asian Pacific AIDS Council and the editor of a few community organizational newsletters (including Seattle Chapter

Video Tribute to Japanese American Musicians completed

A new video called "Music to Remember: A Tribute to Japanese American Musicians and Singers of the '40s" is now available for sale. The 2~ hour video is a tape of the concert that was held at the Japan America Theatre in Los Angeles in February of this year. John Esaki of Visual Communications edited the tape.

Featured in the concert are Sue (Takimoto) Okabe, formerly of Seattle and now of Gardena, who sang here and at Minidoka camp, and Chickie (Ishihara) White, formerly of Enumclaw and Seattle, who sang in Minidoka and later with Nikkei bands and now living in Vancouver, Washington. They are two of the three female singers on the tape; the third singer is Mary Nomura, a Californian who was known as the "Songbird of Manzanar."

Seattle native George Yoshida is also featured. He plays the drums in a band and is interviewed about his forth-coming book he is writing on the Nisei musicians of the past. Marilyn Tokuda handles some of the MC chores while Kathy (Okuda) Ujiiye, formerly of Sumner and now of Torrance, dances a few numbers with her partner, including a jitterbug.

Author Elaine Hosozawa-Nagano read portions of heabook, "Chopsticks from America," a tale of two Japanese American children who move to Japan and learn about life in the land of their ancestors.

Author Janet Mitsui Brown, read her book, "Thanks-giving at Obaachan's," a cute story of a young girl who thinks Thanksgiving spent with her Obaachan is special. Not only does she get to eat the traditional Thanksgiving dishes, but a few special Japanese treats.

The authors all write for a company dedicated to publishing stories of and by Asian Americans. Sandra Yamate, founder of the company, Polychrome, was in town with the authors. She founded the company so that children can get a balance of stories that includes those of Asian American life. Although the audience was very small, Sandra is hopeful that a future trip to the Seattle area will generate a larger audience.
