Community volunteers start API 'non-traditional' leadership training institute

Why is it important to invest in leaders who embrace community values? The strength of a community, however one defines community, is dependent on the commitment and competency of its constituents. The purpose of our leadership institute is to develop individuals who are committed to the well-being of their communities. These individuals are not necessarily aspiring to be the corporate boardroom or to run for public office, but they may aspire to lead a private non-profit board, or to take a leadership role in church. They may have ambitions but simply do not have access to more mainstream avenues. We believe we can develop leaders who can fill that niche.

I have been fortunate to learn and benefit from the knowledge of others in many ways. As a children's advocate, elected official, or civic activist, I have learned from others, sometimes through more traditional means such as workshops and schools, and other times more informally, such as through conversations with community activists, or through a community brainstorming session in response to a community need.

For me, admittedly not a traditional learner, such experiences have proven invaluable. I have long felt that we need a more non-traditional approach for young people to develop leadership skills. The leadership institute, scheduled to begin in early next year, will fill that void.

We have received our tax-exempt status. We have concluded our survey and are conducting focus groups. We are researching other similar endeavors nationally. We have a core group of highly motivated volunteers, including JACLers Akemi Matsumoto, Jefrey Hattori, Anndi Kawamura, Mike Lattimer, Randy Aoyama and Jill Nishi. My hope is that you will become as enthusiastic about this community investment as I am and will choose to become involved. Resisters

Several Nisei have called or written to share their views on the 241, Delta, UT 84624. proposed national JACL resolution to apologize to the WW2 Nisei draft resisters for previously failing to recognize the validity of their



stances. As things stand now, five of eight JACL districts, representing a majority of 108 chapters nationwide, have voted in favor of the resolution. Here in Seattle, our largely Sansei board has decided to let the resolution rest there because we lack a relative

advantage in further debating it.

Before coming to this point, we evaluated the resolution and voted on it as best we could in the limited time we were given by the national office. Also, PNW chapter representatives Elaine Akagi,

James Arima (Lake Washington Chapter), Steve Kono (Puyallup Valley), Bob Nakamura (Olympia), Arlene Oki, and myself lobbied unsuccessfully at the mid-July tri-District conference in Ogden to convince other Districts to revise its wording. Now, after two months of hearing and reading both sides, I can only say that the resisters issue remains a complex, divisive topic.

One problem is that many relevant historical details about the wartime activities of the JACL and the resisters remain poorly documented. Thus, I would encourage others with comments to send

them to the Pacific Citizen (PC) as letters. There, new insights have the best chance of being heard broadly. What has emerged clearly is that we have more constructive things to do than to dwell on this resolution. We must keep our eyes "on the prize" of working on issues that will make positive differences in our commu-

The Topaz Museum

As described in the July 23-29 PC, the struggling Topaz Museum in Delta, Utah, is leading a drive to save the Topaz internment site by purchasing former camp-land threatened by encroaching agriculture. In contrast to the Minidoka camp that housed most Seattle JAs, the Topaz site for Bay-Area JAs remains remarkably well preserved. Protective measures at Topaz are being led by a local teacher, Jane Beckwith, whose heart and commitment were evident to all present on a field trip from the tri-District meeting.

Issei Journeys

On the topic of our vanishing history, little is known of the travels of Issei leaders who were arrested and incarcerated separately from their families during WW2. As pointed out to me by James Arima, an incomplete list of about 400 of these men who were held at Ft. Missoula, Montana, appears in Carol Van Valkenburg's An Alien Place (1995, Pictorial Histories Publishing, 116 pp., \$10.95). I mention this because independently I've been compiling information about these and other Issei for use in a bookmanuscript tracing my grandfather's (Tadashi Yamaguchi) WW2 journey, and the men he encountered along his way. But I'm lack-

ing key information known to many Nisei: (1) On what dates were individual men arrested? (2) What were their occupations and main JA community activities? (3) At what camp(s) were they interned? (4) When and where did they rejoin their families? (5) Does correspondence exist doc menting such recollections? All information can be left on my phone (on the back page); copies of correspondence can be mailed to me at the chapter address (no originals please). Your contributions might one day help grandchildren better understand their family histories, just as finding
