

State Civil Liberties Bill passes Education Committee unanimously but sent back to Committee later

A proposed bill to provide seed money (\$40,000) to develop educational materials about the WWII eviction and incarceration of Japanese Americans and other similar mass violations of civil liberties, passed unanimously out of the State House Education Committee January 13, only to be referred back to the Education Committee a week later.

The Civil Liberties Education Bill (HB 1572) was referred back to the Education Committee in order to avoid the House Appropriations Committee, where in all likelihood it would have died. In the past, bills with fiscal impact under \$50,000 did not have to go through the Appropriations Committee. This term, all bills with fiscal impact are being routed through the Appropriations Committee, regardless of the amount.

According to Anndi Kawamura of Rep. Kip Tokuda's office, the strategy now is to get the bill passed without the money, establishing the policy, then working to get the funding later. In addition, a provision setting up a fund into which people can make donations is being considered as an amendment.

Rep. Tokuda (Dem.), who co-sponsored the bi-partisan measure with Rep. Mike Wensman (Rep.), said that the bill would provide for programs which would "ensure that the painful lessons of our past will be remembered."

Rep. Sharon Tomiko Santos reiterated Tokuda's sentiment saying, "Remembering the past is a remedy for the future. We need to educate everyone to be true to our vow: Never again."

Rep. Santos said that the bill needs support from all legislators, but especially from those outside the Seattle area, and urges constituents of legislators outside Seattle to contact their Representative. Besides Representatives Tokuda, Wensman and Santos, those signing on to the bill so far are Representatives Velma Veloria, Dave Quall, Mark Schofler, Steve Conway, Ed Murray, Dow Constantine, Val Ogden, Phil Rockefeller, Phyllis Kenney, Al O'Brien, Dave Schmidt and Kathy Haigh.

Seattle Chapter Board voted to support King County Councilmember Larry Gossett's proposed Ordinance 99-0472 which would establish a logo for King County in the likeness of the Rev. Doctor Martin Luther King, Jr. Over a decade ago, the county was renamed after Dr. King, but the current logo still features a silhouette of a crown.

King County was originally named after William Rufus DeVane King, the 13th U.S. vice-president (under President Franklin Pierce) who died one week after taking office.

By adopting this ordinance, King County will finally have a symbol that embodies an individual who was a humanitarian and inspiration for all peoples across this nation. Paying Tributes for Puyallup

In 1942, Marguerite Eyrikson and her family rented an apartment in Puyallup from the Tomita family. A few months later the Tomita family, along with other Japanese Americans, were evicted and confined to makeshift barracks at the Puyallup fairgrounds. Eyrikson found it unbelievable and shocking that she couldn't visit with them except through the fence which separated the Japanese American family from the world outside.

Later, she marveled at the Nisei soldiers who were fighting in the war while their families were still incarcerated. She decided that in her lifetime she would like to honor these veterans.

At age 84, Marguerite Eyrikson decided that this was the time and told her daughter that they should honor them somehow.

In September last year, at the Puyallup Fairgrounds, Marguerite's daughter Lydia Pressey and her company, LP Productions produced

"A Salute to Nisei Veterans," a tribute to the Nisei veterans. Between 200-300 veterans attended the gathering.

Now the Puyallup Chapter and the Nisei Veterans Committee are honoring LP Productions for their tribute. The Puyallup chapter is inviting all to a "Special Tribute to LP Productions," Sunday, February 13 at the Kabuki Restaurant (2919 South 38th St., Tacoma) at 2 PM. The program honoring Lynda and Rod Pressey, Marguerite Eyrikson, Ed Aliverti (also of LP Productions) and Puyallup Fairgrounds Manager Robert Carlson, will be followed by lunch and Karaoke.

Gordon Hirabayashi speaks!

In 1942, Gordon Hirabayashi deliberately disobeyed the curfew orders issued to Japanese Americans in Seattle. He prepared a three-quarter page statement of principle and conscience, "Why I'm Taking This Stand," to deliver to the authorities.

On the Day of Remembrance, February 19, Hirabayashi will reflect on his 1942 statement.

Hirabayashi's talk will be followed by brief formal responses by the community, University of Washington faculty members and an hour-long discussion with the audience.

Hirabayashi will be at speaking at the Theatre Off Jackson (409 Seventh Ave. South, Seattle) 1-3 PM. A reception will follow upstairs at the Wing Luke Asian Museum (407 Seventh Ave. South). The event is free and open to the public.

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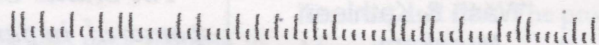
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
