## From Hiroshima to Hope

'undreds of lanterns were afloat on Green Lake to commemorate the 58th anniversary of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, part of Seattle's *From Hiroshima* to Hope event, held the evening of August 6,

2003. From Hiroshima to Hope not only commemorates the first ever atomic bomb victims, which tragically took over 150,000 lives, this event further recognizes victims of war and violence everywhere, symbolizing a strong commitment to world peace.

The evening's program started at 6:30 PM as nearly 2,000 guests and participants were greeted by "gathering music" performed by the World Meditation Ensemble and the Silk Strings group.

As part of the program, Tatsuo Nakata, President of the Seattle JACL Chapter, read a letter from Mayor Tadatoshi Akiba of Hiroshima which stated, "...it is profoundly meaningful and beneficial that so many (Seattle) people have participated and kept From Hiroshima to Hope happening every year since 1984. On behalf of the people of Hiroshima, I hereby express ur admiration and gratitude to all who make it happen..."

Reverend Koichi Barrish, from the Tsubaki Shinto Shine, performed the introductory blessing. Seattle Kokon Taiko followed with a performance, their 15th consecutive appearance at the event. Then there was the Arab Children's Dabke Choir and the Arab and Jewish Children's Choir, both of which moved the crowd. Tripat Singh, Muna Mohamud, and Kiyoshi Shikuma were chosen to present this year's keynote remarks, offering words on the topic of "Peace from My Perspective."

For the first time, Sikh community calligraphers joined Japanese, Beikoku Shodo Kenkyukai calligraphers in writing messages of peace and friendship on beautiful paper lanterns. Children from different communities also made origami cranes that were sent to Hiroshima as a message of hope.

The Lantern Floating Ceremony (Toro Nagashi) concluded the evening with paper lanterns set adrift on Green Lake. This portion of the *From Hiroshima to Hope* event is adapted from ancient Buddhist ritual with lanterns set adrift, representing the souls of the dead, and prayers offered to assure the souls a 'peaceful rest. Reverend Shobo Mitomo, Seattle Nichiren Buddhist Church, started the ceremonial chanting of the Buddhist sutra, leading a procession to the lake's edge. The candle-lit paper lanterns were released to carry their prayers and peace messages. For more than an hour the gathering 'vatched, as lanterns floated slowly in a serpent-like formation

lights, on an otherwise darkened lake.
