IACL Gala Dinner

Over 800 people gathered at the gala dinner to celebrate "An American Testimonial: A Salute to the Japanese American National Leaders" on September 13th at the Wilshire Grand Hotel in Los Angeles. The dinner recognized the Honorable Norman Mineta, Senator Daniel Inouye, Congressman Robert Matsui, and Congressman Mike Honda. To paraphrase Senator Inouye, it was JACL's way of saying "okagesama-de."

The atmosphere was warm and friendly with Wendy Tokuda (Kip Tokuda's sister), San Francisco TV Anchor, as Mistress of Ceremonies. The program included a salute to the late Congresswoman Patsy Mink. Her tribute was particularly touching as music accompanied a slide presentation detailing her life and accomplishments. Further in the program, each honoree gave their remarks, focusing on what seemed to be a unified theme: the accomplishments and continued importance of JACL and the unique voice that Japanese Americans can articulate while facing assaults on civil liberties and civil rights.

Special thanks to the efforts of Rose Nohara, Lake Washington JACL President, and for the representation shown by the Pacific Northwest District with well over twenty people who made the trip down to Los Angeles.

It was a productive and busy year of activity, setting up the Nikkei Heritage Association of Washington (NHAW). The NHAW Core Committee filed Articles of Incorporation in the State of Washington. This was done with the assistance of Sharon Sakamoto, providing probono legal services. The Committee also completed and adopted a Charter, Bylaws, held elections, and filed for 501(c)(3) status. The organization now seems ready to launch the second phase of its mission to develop a Japanese Cultural and Community Center in Seattle.

NHAW officers include: Ron Mamiya, president; Lori Matsukawa, vice president; Kip Tokuda, vice president; Dee Goto, treasurer; and Arlene Oki, secretary. It is expected that more names will be added to the Honorary Board and working Board of Directors in the near future.

Community outreach continues to be important, gaining support for the building of the Japanese Cultural and Community Center. Lori, Ron and Kip have met with approximately twenty different groups to announce the formation of the NHAW and to solicit ideas on the creation of the center.

Groups such as the Taiko and Budo organizations have already submitted to the NHAW proposals for the use of the center. Discussions on a site for the center have not formally started though the topic is drawing a lot of comments and conjecture from the community.

Recently, NHWA met with a group representing Nikkei and cultural organizations to discuss their role in planning and developing the center. Under the skillful facilitation of Nellie Fujii Anderson, they shared their "wish lists," covering activities they hope to see at the center, the future needs of their organizations, and what each might bring to the NHAW's efforts. A follow-up meeting will be held on November 15.

Thanks to Ted Yamaura of the Japanese Chamber of Commerce and Executive Development Institute (EDI), NHAW was assigned a team of talented young professionals from EDI to compile the results of a survey. The survey was disseminated to Nikkei in the greater Seattle area to assess the level of support and potential use of the center by the community. The team has also developed a questionnaire to solicit useful information on "best practices" from other cultural centers in the U.S. and Canada; the results of which are now trickling in.

Finally, we hope that everyone will support the Sake & Sushi Fest on October 29 with part of the proceeds going to benefit the NHAW. The event will be from 5-8:30 PM at the Grand Hyatt in downtown Seattle. Tickets are \$50 (patron) or \$100 (premier patron). Please contact (206) 320-1010 to purchase your tickets.
