Seattle JACL Chapter members host Soviet visitors at Goodwill Friendship Center

On Thursday, August 2, 1990, the Seattle Chapter JACL served as hosts at the Pepsi Friendship Center for Soviet visitors attending the Goodwill Games and Arts Festival. Chapter members and members of the public met with many Soviet citizens, and watched fabulous performances by several Soviet dance troupes and artists.

The Friendship Center was located at the Seattle Center in front of the Flag Pavilion. A large tent covered most of the pavilion, and provided a shady respite from the sun. Pepsi provided all volunteers with — of course — pepsi, a special Friendship Center Pin, and a t-shirt.

Friendship Center staff said that most of the 1,400 Soviets visiting Seattle. Attendance at the Center, not including the Soviets, was estimated at 2,300 each day, or nearly 50,000 people for the two weeks that the Friendship Center was open.

Many of the Soviet visitors I met were associated with the Goodwill Games athletic events, including coaches for basketball, wrestling, and hockey. Also in attendance was a member of the Supreme Soviet, the highest governing body in the Soviet Union. He was accompanied by two official-looking escorts well-dressed in blue blazers and carrying cellular telephones.

The Friendship Center served as a vital focal point for Soviet visitors and their host families. Because there were several interpreters present at the Center, many host families came to the Center to use the interpreters to better communicate with their Soviet guests.

Hannah Kato helped to organize the many members of *Tomo no kai* who helped host at the Friendship Center that day. Tim Otani also helped organize JACL participation.

Asian Bar Association Community Law Program


